Cyclone Montha leaves 2 dead, flattens crops in A.P.

Severe cyclonic storm Montha left a trail of destruction in Andhra Pradesh, leaving two persons dead and inundating agricultural crops across 87,000 hectares. It also damaged roads, bridges and culverts, and uprooted trees, officials said after a preliminary assessment.

The severe cyclonic storm crossed the Andhra Pradesh and Yanam coasts between 11.30 p.m. on Tuesday and 12.30 a.m. on Wednesday, close to Narapuram in Andhra Pradesh, the India Meteorological Department said.

Wind speeds touched 90 kmph near the Machilipatnam coast as the storm crossed the coast. It gradually weakened into a cyclonic storm by 2.30 a.m. and then into a deep depression by 8.30 a.m. on Wednesday, it added.

At 5.30 p.m., the deep depression over north Andhra Pradesh, south Odisha, south Chhattisgarh and northeast Telangana weakened into a depression over south Chhattisgarh. It is likely to move northwards and weaken into a well-marked low-pressure area during the next 12 hours, the bulletin at 8.30 p.m. said.

According to the preliminary assessment, crops were damaged on 87,000 hectares across 304 mandals and 1,825 villages. Over 59,000 hectares of paddy, cotton, maize, and black gram fields were submerged, resulting in severe losses to 78,796 farmers.

Several roads, 14 bridges, and multiple culverts were damaged. About 2,294 km of roads were affected, with losses estimated at ₹1,424 crore. The Rural Water Supply department sustained losses of ₹36 crore, while irrigation works worth ₹16.45 crore were affected.

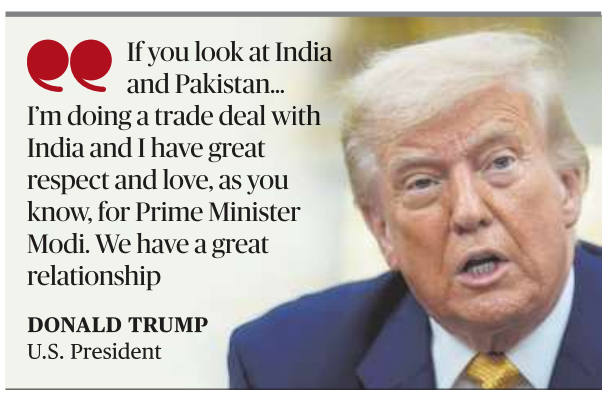
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U.S. is doing a trade deal with India, says Trump

At APEC CEO summit in South Korea, U.S. President says he has a great relationship with Modi; he reiterates claim that he used trade to resolve the conflict between India and Pakistan in May

U.S. President Donald Trump on Wednesday said Washington is "doing a trade deal with India", and emphasised that he has "a great relationship" with Prime Minister Narendra Modi, as both sides continue negotiations on a proposed pact.



"If you look at India and Pakistan... so, I'm doing a trade deal with India and I have great respect and love, as you know, for Prime Minister Modi. We have a great relationship," Mr. Trump said at the APEC (Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation) CEO Summit in Gyeongju, South Korea.

"Prime Minister Modi is the nicest looking guy... he's tough as hell," Mr. Trump added. He landed in South Korea on Wednesday morning from Japan as part of a three-nation tour of Asia.

Mr. Trump, who did not elaborate on trade talks, reiterated his claim that he used trade to resolve the war between India and Pakistan in May.

"I called Prime Minister Modi. I said, we can't make

a trade deal with you... (He said) No, no, we must make a trade... I said, No, we can't. You are starting a war with Pakistan. We're not going to do it," Mr. Trump said.

Praises Pak. Army chief
He also praised Pakistan's Army chief Field Marshal Asim Munir, calling him "a great fighter" and "a great guy." "Then I called Pakistan. I said, we're not going to do trade with you because you're fighting with India and you know, two nuclear nations. And they said, no, no, no, you should let us fight. They both said that," he added.

Mr. Trump claimed that the leaders of both India and Pakistan called him after two days and stopped fighting. "After literally two

days, they called up, they said, we understand, and they stopped fighting. How is that? Isn't that amazing? Now, you think [Joe] Biden would have done that?" Mr. Trump said.

The previous day, in Tokyo, Mr. Trump said he brought the war to an end in 24 hours.

'Under strain'
The U.S. President's comment came at a time when the relations between New Delhi and Washington have been reeling under severe strain after Mr. Trump imposed 50% tariffs on India, including an additional 25% levies for its procurement of Russian crude oil.

FTA talks with EU crossed halfway mark: Piyush Goyal

The negotiations between India and the European Union on a free trade agreement have crossed the halfway mark, with 10 out of 20 chapters of the agreement having been finalised, and several other chapters nearing completion, Union Commerce Minister Piyush Goyal said on Wednesday.

"We have made significant progress in the three-day discussion between European Commissioner for Trade and Economic Security Maros Sefcovic and his team and our team on several areas," Mr. Goyal said at a press briefing.

"We have agreed to close 10 out of 20 chapters. Another four to five chapters have in principle been broadly decided."

Evacuation strategy helped check losses, says CM

Efficient evacuation strategy helped the government minimise loss of life during Cyclone Montha which crossed the Andhra Pradesh coast post Tuesday midnight, Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu has said, adding that more than 1.8 lakh people were evacuated to 2,200 relief camps.

Mr. Naidu took stock of the cyclone impact at Odalarevu in Allavaram mandal of Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Konaseema district, Bapatla and Machilipatnam during an aerial survey on Wednesday.

"Past experiences of

erfolk who failed to undertake fishing activities and handloom weavers would be given 50 kgs of rice, apart from essential commodities. They will also be paid ₹3,000 per family. The other affected people will get 25 kgs of rice.

Later in the day, the Chief Minister inspected damaged paddy and horticultural crops in Dr. B. R. Ambedkar Konaseema district. At Bendamuru Lanka, he inspected damaged paddy fields and interacted with farmers.

Addressing a review meeting at the Secretariat later, Mr. Naidu asked the officials to ensure the immediate restoration of power supply and road

connectivity in all the affected mandals.

Drainage systems should be strengthened to prevent water stagnation. Cleanliness and sanitation works should be intensified. Distribution of essentials at the relief camps should be expedited, he said.

As part of the relief measures, 3,175 pregnant women were shifted to safer locations, and 2,130 medical camps were set up. Mr. Naidu also conducted a teleconference with the Collectors, Ministers, and officials to review the situation in affected areas.

Israel says ceasefire is back after strikes kill 104 in Gaza

Israel's military said on Wednesday that the ceasefire was back on in Gaza after it carried out heavy airstrikes overnight across the Palestinian territory that killed 104 people, including 46 children, according to local officials.

The strikes, the deadliest since the ceasefire began on October 10, marked the most serious challenge to the truce to date. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said he had ordered the strikes after accusing Hamas of violating the ceasefire for

handing over body parts this week that Israel said were partial remains of a hostage recovered earlier in the war. That was compounded by the shooting and killing of an Israeli soldier during an exchange of gunfire in Rafah.

Hamas denied any involvement in the shooting.

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A.P. govt. sets record target to procure 51 lakh tonnes of paddy

Civil Supplies Minister Nandendra Manohar on Wednesday said the State government has set a record target of procuring 51 lakh metric tonnes of paddy from farmers this agricultural season.

Addressing the media, he said the government is committed to supporting every farmer affected by

the recent cyclone. Paddy would be purchased directly from farmers, and the payment would be credited to their bank accounts within 48 hours of procurement.

Mr. Manohar recalled that the State had procured 34 lakh metric tonnes of paddy during the previous season. Discussions have also been held with rice millers to procure moisture-affected paddy due to

heavy rains and the cyclone impact.

He asked officials to submit detailed reports on crop damage by October 30, covering agriculture, horticulture, animal husbandry, and aquaculture sectors. He said tarpaulins have been stocked in all Rythu Seva Kendras, ranging from 10 to 30 units per centre, and are being distributed free of cost to farmers in need.

500 Indians in Thai custody to be repatriated

India will repatriate 500 of its citizens who recently crossed into Thailand, fleeing from a Myanmar military operation against a cybercrime hub there, Thai Prime Minister Anutin Charnvirakul said, according to a Bangkok Post report on Wednesday.

The Myanmar military has carried out operations against the KK Park cyber crime hub in the Myawaddy township in southeast

"They had crossed into Thailand from Myanmar over the past few days. Our Mission in Thailand is working closely with Thai authorities to verify their nationality and to repatriate them, after necessary legal formalities are

completed in that country," Mr. Jaiswal said.

Govt's PPP model for medical colleges anti-poor, says YSRCP

The YSR Congress Party (YSRCP) has intensified its 'One-Crore Signature Movement', describing it as a people's uprising against the TDP-led alliance government's alleged plan to privatise government medical colleges. Party leaders said the move would turn medical education and healthcare into luxuries beyond the reach of poor families. Terming the Public-Private Partnership (PPP) model "anti-poor and pro-corporate," YSRCP leaders on Wednesday demanded its immediate withdrawal, accusing Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu of "selling the future of poor students to private profiteers."

He further said the government should assist farmers in the cyclone-hit districts to raise their second crop.

DISCOMs incur ₹17.84 crore loss due to infra damage

Chief Secretary and Special CS (Energy) K. Vijayanand praised the Electricity department staff for their commendable services in ensuring power supply to the public during cyclone Montha by overcoming adverse conditions with efficiency.

According to the CS, the DISCOMs incurred a loss of nearly ₹17.84 crore on account of damages to their infrastructure. He stated in a press release that over 11,000 employees from various cadres were deployed in the affected areas to prevent interruptions to electricity supply.

He said that alternative

He appreciated the efforts of the DISCOM staff.

Two persons held for cyberfraud

The Crime Investigation Department (CID) arrested two persons for allegedly using the photograph of Human Resources Department Minister Nara Lokesh and committing cyber-fraud.

The accused used Mr. Lokesh's photograph as their WhatsApp display picture and posed as Surendra, TDP NRI Convener, to cheat the public under the guise of providing medical assistance.

The main accused, Konduri Rajesh of Vijayawada, was arrested in January this year near the India-Nepal Border in West Bengal and subsequently, the other two accused were arrested on Wednesday. The CID arrested Guttikonda Sai Srinath of Hyderabad and Chithhadi Thala Sumanth of Patancheru in Telangana.

According to the CID, the three accused collected information from individuals seeking medical or financial aid by searching hashtags like #help@naralokesh, #help@pawankalyan, and #help@ncbn on X. Using U.S. based phone numbers, they contacted victims via WhatsApp, posing as Surendra, TDP NRI Convener, and obtained bank account and medical bill details from victims under the pretext of offering financial help.

"The accused sent fake U.S. bank transfer receipts showing credit of ₹10 lakh to victims' accounts. Later, they impersonated bank officials from Indian numbers, claiming that funds were held up and demanding 4 percent remittance charges to release the amount," the CID said.

After collecting money, they issued additional fake receipts citing "income tax clearance issues" and eventually stopped all communication. They provided bank accounts to Rajesh for receiving and transferring illegally obtained funds, the CID said.

Ryots stare at loss as storm devastates crops

Strong winds wreak havoc in Krishna district; according to preliminary crop damage report, standing paddy crops on 45,040 hectares, blackgram on 985 hectares, groundnut on 288.2 hectares and cotton on all 43 hectares have been damaged; 56,040 farmers have been affected

While Cyclone Montha did not cause much rainfall in Krishna district, it did, however, cause strong winds that left agricultural crops damaged on 46,359 hectares, most of which is paddy.

According to India Meteorological Department, the wind speed on Tuesday touched 65 kmph in Machilipatnam. The winds brought down 446 electric poles, damaged 30 transformers and uprooted 506 trees in the district, according to preliminary report from the Krishna district administration. One person, K. Subba Rao, died after a tree fell on him in Kruthivenu.

According to the report, standing paddy crops on 45,040 hectares, blackgram on 985 hectares,

groundnut on 288.2 hectares and cotton on all 43 hectares have been damaged and 56,040 farmers

affected. A full enumeration will be done later. P. Rama Rao, Maganti Nagaraju and Suresh are among

the farmers whose paddy crops suffered damage due to the cyclone.

Rama Rao, who has 15 acres of paddy near National Highway 65 in Guduru mandal, invested ₹45,000 per acre. He now worries that the expenditure will only increase. "Harvesting one acre of paddy crop usually takes an hour-and-a-half using a machine. Now, it will take the same machine more than five hours," he says. The farmer pays ₹3,000 or more for one hour of using the machine.

The cyclone came at a time when the crop was two weeks away from harvest. "Now we will wait for ten days before harvesting the crop. In the meantime, if it rains again, the damage and expenses will only in-

crease," says Nagaraju, while assessing the extent of damage for his crop. Around 70% of it is damaged, he concludes.

Out of ₹45,000 expenditure per acre, the farmers here say they may recover only ₹10,000-₹15,000. The rice millers will take their produce at a lesser price and sell it to the government at a higher price, they say. "We will not benefit in any way."

In Pamarru mandal, farmers were seen lamenting over the fallen banana and papaya trees. The fruits had fallen to the ground due to the winds.

District Agricultural Officer Padmavathi said the State government will provide input subsidy to those farmers who have suffered 33% loss of their yield.

Ensured safe operations during cyclone Montha: SCR

The Vijayawada Division of South Central Railway (SCR) ensured passenger safety, sanitation and community readiness during Cyclone Montha by operating in full alert mode. Officials mobilised men and machinery to meet any emergency arising out of the cyclone on train operations, an SCR release said. Trains were terminated when warranted and passengers accommodated in other trains. Monsoon reserves on wheels were strategically positioned to respond quickly to any obstruction. Anemometers were installed to record real-time wind speeds.

200 workers stuck in tunnel rescued

During the cyclone-induced rains, around 200 workers were caught in floodwater inside a tunnel at Veligonda Project near Kotturu village in Peddadaornala mandal of Prakasam district on Tuesday. The project officials rescued them within few hours.

According to the sources, the heavy inflows of floodwater from the surrounding areas entered the tunnel where the workers were involved in lining work. They were stuck amid floodwater in the tunnel underground.

As soon as the project officials got the information about the workers trapped in the tunnel, they have launched a rescue operation.

The rescue teams immediately evacuated the workers using the tunnel's vertical entry shaft and shifted them to Kollam Vagu, downstream of Krishna river.

A senior official of Veligonda Project said that all workers were brought safely to Sunnipeta.

Arrangements were made to send them to Sri-sailam through boats in two batches within few hours.

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Flood-hit farmers pick up the pieces in Guntur

GUNTUR

With the Cyclone Montha-induced rains submerging fields, damaging crops and clogging canals, farmers in parts of Guntur district are staring at massive losses. Cotton and chilli crops in Prathipadu mandal were particularly devastated, with cultivators fearing total loss. They also complained of poor canal maintenance and shortage of urea, which, they said, worsened their woes.

District Collector A. Thameem Ansariya on Wednesday toured the affected areas, including Prathipadu, Pedanandipadu and Kakumanu mandals, to assess the situation. She inspected the flow of water at Kondaveedu valley stream, ongoing canal desilting works, and relief camps set up at Zilla Parishad High Schools in Prathipadu and Pedanandipadu.

Crossing the flooded Nakkalavagu and Mekalavagu streams on a tractor, the Collector reached Varagani and Nandipadu to meet local residents and

farmers. She directed officials to speed up post-cyclone relief measures and ensure sanitation in all affected villages.

Speaking to the media, the Collector said crop damage assessments would be completed within two days. She added that 5,000 quintals of urea were available in the district, electricity restoration was in progress, and 84 fallen trees were being cleared from roads. Over 9,000 people are currently sheltered in 153 relief centres, where essential supplies are being distributed as per the Chief Minister's orders.

Relief for crop loss sought

Heavy rain disrupts normal life in Palnadu district

Heavy rains on account of Cyclone Montha caused severe disruption of normal life across Palnadu district on Wednesday, with major waterlogging having been reported at several locations.

APSRTC services to all villages are likely to be restored by Thursday morning. At some areas, the authorities either stopped or diverted heavy vehicles. One of the most affected areas was near the underpass bridge on National Highway 16 bypass at Thimmapuram in Edlapadu mandal, where waterlogging stopped traffic and posed risks to nearby agricultural fields.

District Collector Kritika Shukla inspected the site and instructed the officials to have the stagnant water drained. She said the floodwater should not be allowed to enter nearby agri-

APSRTC services to all villages are likely to be restored by Thursday morning

Similar problems were reported in Chilakaluripet. The Collector, accompanied by MLA Prattipati Pularao, inspected the location and directed civic and revenue officials to take remedial action. In Nuzendla mandal, the Gundlakamma vagu (a stormwater drain) overflowed at Inavolu village and at Parigacherla in Rompicherla mandal water overflowing from tanks flooded roads.

At Muttanapalli-Munumaka railway road, fallen trees blocking the water flow were removed with cranes, restoring the natural stream course. Water stagnation was cleared in Mulakaluru SC Colony of Narasaraopet mandal, where water was pumped into the main canal.

'Foolproof' arrangements reduced rain damage

The government's quick and foolproof arrangements to deal with Severe Cyclonic Storm Montha have reduced the extent of damage to life and property, said Minister for Health Satya Kumar Yadav.

Addressing the media in Vijayawada Wednesday, Mr. Satya Kumar Yadav said Chief Minister N. Chandrababu Naidu had issued directions to all the departments concerned, which worked in coordination to minimise damage.

Mr. Satya Kumar Yadav was speaking after reviewing cyclone relief operations from the Command Control Centre set up on the premises of the Collectorate. Mr. Satya Kumar Yadav, NTR District Collector G. Lakshminsha and Vijayawada Municipal Corporation (VMC) Commissioner Dhyanchandra H.M. inspected the water-logged roads in the city.

Two houses collapse in Bapatla

Two houses collapsed at Chirala and Repelle divisions in Bapatla district owing to the heavy rains brought by Cyclone Montha on Wednesday, said District Collector V. Vinod Kumar, while reacting to reports that a death occurred in the aftermath of the cyclone. He said a 90-year-old woman died due to heart stroke at a house in Nagaram. He said the district administration has placed 7,099 people in 126 rehabilitation centres and rescued 15 people at Parchur. Police saved two railway staff, returning home on a motorcycle, from drowning in flood waters at Chinaganjam mandal.

Due to heavy inflow from Nallamada forest area, the Gundlakamma reservoir overflowed at Addanki. The police rescued three persons stranded here. The District Collector said the administration prevented submergence of Parchur town and adjacent villages by diverting the overflowing Parchur Vagu to agriculture fields.

Govt. begins free supply of essentials

Deputy Chief Minister K. Pawan Kalyan stated on 'X' that the government was distributing essential commodities free of cost to people staying in rehabilitation centres in the cyclone Montha-affected areas, as well as to fishermen and handloom workers who lost their livelihoods.

Officials of the Food and Civil Supplies Department, acting on the instructions of Civil Supplies Minister Nandendla Manohar, have taken steps to stock these items in Fair Price Shops (FPS).

A total of one lakh metric tonnes (MT) of rice, 3,424 MT of sugar, and other essential goods are being distributed to the cyclone-affected people through 14,415 FPS.

Ministers Vangalapati Anitha (Home and Disaster Management) and Anagani Satya Prasad (Revenue) are

coordinating the relief operations, Mr. Kalyan said.

According to G.O. Rt. No.115 issued by Special Chief Secretary (Disaster Management-FAC) G. Sai Prasad, the government has permitted the District Collectors of the affected districts to distribute 25 kg of rice, one kilo each of toor dal (pigeon peas), onions, potatoes, and sugar, and one litre of palm oil to every family staying in relief camps.

Fishermen and handloom weaver families will receive 50 kg of rice each. This distribution of essential commodities is in addition to the benefits admissible under the State Disaster Response Fund (SDRF) norms.

The Commissioner of Civil Supplies and the Vice-Chairman and Managing Director of Andhra Pradesh State Civil Supplies Corporation Limited have been instructed to take immediate necessary action.

Livestock suffer massive losses as Cyclone Montha batters Andhra Pradesh

The State government announces ₹50,000 compensation per buffalo and ₹25,000 per calf as reports confirm over 200 livestock and poultry deaths across several districts

Cyclone Montha has left a trail of devastation across coastal and southern Andhra Pradesh, claiming livestock and damaging rural assets on a massive scale.

Preliminary reports from the Animal Husbandry Department on Wednesday indicate that more than 200 cattle and poultry deaths occurred across several districts.

In view of the losses, the government has announced compensation of ₹50,000 per buffalo, ₹25,000 per calf, and ₹100 per poultry bird for affected farmers.

The losses were reported from Guntur, Krishna, and East and West Godavari districts, where torrential rains and high winds inundated cattle sheds and poultry farms.

Veterinary teams have been deployed to affected mandals to provide treatment, fodder, and shelter for surviving animals. District Collectors have been instructed to carry out immediate enumeration and release compensation

without delay. According to district-wise reports, Visakhapatnam recorded the highest rainfall of 187.1 mm, resulting in the loss of four animals and damage to ten cattle sheds. Anakapalli district received 128.4 mm of rainfall, reporting the loss of three animals, 150 poultry birds, and damage to 11 cattle sheds. In Kakinada district, rainfall measured 36.3 mm, where one animal died and 600 ducks were washed away.

East Godavari district recorded 69 mm of rainfall, leading to three animal deaths, while Konaseema received 18.5 mm and re-

ported four animal losses. West Godavari recorded 31.5 mm with two animal deaths, and Eluru district saw 43.5 mm of rainfall with four animal casualties.

In the Krishna delta, Krishna district received 50.8 mm of rain with 28 animal deaths, while Guntur recorded 75.3 mm and reported 55 deaths – the highest in the State. Bapatla and Prakasam districts received 150.3 mm and 184 mm respectively, with Prakasam reporting ten animal deaths and damage to several veterinary buildings. SPSR Nellore district re-

corded 180.7 mm of rainfall with three animal deaths, while Srikakulam reported 34 animal deaths after receiving 60.25 mm of rain. Vizianagaram district received 106.47 mm and suffered damage to 53 veterinary buildings, while Tirupati and NTR districts recorded 75.8 mm and 76.43 mm respectively.

Officials said livestock and poultry losses were widespread, particularly in low-lying and riverbank mandals where floodwaters entered animal shelters.

The Animal Husbandry and Disaster Management Departments have launched a joint assessment to estimate the full extent of the damage and ensure timely relief for farmers.

Although the cyclone has weakened, residual heavy rains continue over Rayalaseema and south coastal Andhra, prompting authorities to remain on high alert. The government has advised farmers to move their animals to higher ground and take necessary precautions until weather conditions normalise.

RTC suffered ₹10 cr. revenue loss: official

The Andhra Pradesh State Road Transport Corporation (APSRTC) is facing major service disruptions as Cyclone Montha battered several parts of the State.

Following a government advisory urging people to remain indoors due to the cyclone's intensity, road traffic came to a near standstill across many regions. "Consequently, APSRTC has scaled down operations, running buses only on a need basis to ensure essential connectivity," said A. Appala Raju, Executive Director (Operations).

Speaking to *The Hindu*, Mr. Raju said that under normal circumstances, APSRTC buses cover nearly 40 lakh km daily across the State. "However, on Wednesday, only about

50% of the fleet could be operated, covering roughly 20 lakh km, primarily in relatively unaffected regions," he said.

The severe weather conditions not only restricted mobility but also caused a sharp decline in the Corporation's daily revenue, which dropped by nearly 50%, resulting in an estimated ₹10 crore loss for the day, according to the official.

Efforts to restore normal bus services continued through Wednesday, but operations remained partially suspended in several cyclone-hit coastal districts due to widespread road damage and obstructions caused by uprooted trees and electric poles.

Restoration teams have been working on a war footing to clear debris and reopen key transport routes.

Remain on alert for 48 hours: Lokesh to officials

IT and HRD Minister Nara Lokesh instructed District Collectors to remain on alert for the next 48 hours, even though Cyclone Montha had weakened into a deep depression after making landfall near Narsapur in West Godavari district,

as it could still pose a threat to lives and property.

Speaking to Collectors of the cyclone-affected districts on Wednesday, Mr. Lokesh directed officials to ensure 100% restoration of power supply in residential and commercial areas to help people return to normal life at the earliest.

Govt. rolls out digital Incident Management System

The State government has launched a State-wide Incident Management System (IMS) to ensure real-time detection, monitoring, and resolution of critical governance and public welfare issues.

In a Government Order (G.O. No. 17) issued on Wednesday, Chief Secretary K. Vijayanand said the initiative aims to enhance responsiveness, coordination, and transparency across all departments.

The IMS will serve as a digital command network linking key departments, District Collectors, and senior officials. The Real-Time Governance Society (RTGS), in collaboration with the Information and Public Relations (I&PR) Department, will manage the system. Using advanced digital tools, the IMS will track incidents from identification to closure, preventing escalation and ensuring seamless inter-departmental coordination. RTGS and I&PR will continuously monitor media and field reports to flag emerging issues, which will be instantly communicated to concerned officials through secure WhatsApp groups created for each incident. Each group will include the relevant Minister, Principal Secretary, Collector, and Superintendent of Police (SP) until the issue is resolved, ensuring accountability at every level. RTGS will maintain a digital dashboard and analytical reports for the Chief Secretary's weekly review, while I&PR will share verified updates with the public. TDP State president and Gajuwaka MLA Palla Srinivasa Rao hailed the initiative as "a governance revolution."

Reservoirs brim as heavy rains swell inflows in State

VIJAYAWADA

Steady inflows from heavy rains in the upper catchment areas have pushed most major reservoirs in Andhra Pradesh to near-full levels on Wednesday.

Officials of the Water Resources Department said the combined storage in the State's major reservoirs stood at 94.77% of their gross capacity, indicating healthy water availability across the Godavari, Krishna, Penna, and Vamsadhara basins. The gross capacity of all major reservoirs is 1,062.89 TMC, while the present storage reached 1,007.31 TMC, leaving a flood cushion of 55.58 TMC (8.15%).

Krishna Basin

The Srisailem reservoir recorded a level of 884.10 ft against its full reservoir level (FRL) of 885 ft, holding 210.51 TMC of water compared to 206.54 TMC dur-

ing the same period last year. Inflows into Srisailem were 63,439 cusecs, while outflows stood at 96,863 cusecs through power generation and canal releases.

Downstream, the Nagarjuna Sagar reservoir reached 589.80 ft with 311.45 TMC of storage, up from 306.40 TMC a year ago. Inflows were 71,457 cusecs and outflows 64,540 cusecs, mainly for power generation and irrigation.

At Pulichintala, inflows were 44,786 cusecs, with the reservoir holding 43.55 TMC at 173.55 ft. The Prakasam Barrage at Vijayawada saw balanced inflows and outflows of 53,857 cusecs, maintaining water at 57.05 ft – the warning level for the barrage.

Godavari Basin

Most reservoirs in the Godavari basin remained close to full capacity. The Dowlaiswaram (Sir Arthur Cotton) Barrage registered

inflows of 55,862 cusecs, with smooth canal discharges into the Eastern, Central, and Western deltas. Total utilisation from the Godavari delta system since June 1 stood at 130.79 TMC, higher than 116.19 TMC in the corresponding period last year. In the Penna basin, the Somasila reservoir stood at 324.08 ft with 65.05 TMC of storage, compared to 67.65 TMC last year.

The Kandaluru reservoir was at 259.32 ft with 42.38 TMC, ensuring sufficient reserves for irrigation. The Veligodu balancing reservoir in Kadapa district held 15.90 TMC at 866.57 ft, while the Yeleru reservoir in East Godavari stood at 21.78 TMC, slightly above last year's level.

The Gotta Barrage on the Vamsadhara maintained a level of 123.46 ft with 0.50 TMC in storage and inflows of 1,580 cusecs, ensuring steady discharge.

Energy Minister reviews power restoration in cyclone-hit areas

Karnataka holds bus safety audit after Kurnool accident

Following the private bus fire in Andhra Pradesh's Kurnool district on October 24, the Karnataka State Road Transport Corporation (KSRTC) has launched a Statewide safety audit of its fleet. An official said that teams have inspecting buses, with particular focus on emergency exits, fire extinguishers, first-aid kits, and other safety equipment. The renewal and maintenance schedules of vehicles is also being reviewed to identify and address potential risks.

Telangana Medical Council shuts down 17 illegal clinics

The Telangana Medical Council (TGMC), in coordination with the District Medical and Health Officer of Rangareddy district, has sealed 17 unlicensed clinics and first aid centres operating illegally. According to the Council, they were run by individuals posing as doctors and were found recklessly administering antibiotics, steroids, painkillers and abortion pills, posing a serious threat to public health.

Proposal to make M.M. Hills in Karnataka a tiger reserve

The Karnataka Forest department has on Friday convened a public hearing on eliciting opinion from the local community on the proposed move to declare the M.M. Hills Wildlife Sanctuary as a tiger reserve. For quite sometime, there has been a strong opposition to this consensus. C. Made Gowda of Jilla Budakattu Girijana Abhivridhi Sangha said, "We don't want a tiger reserve because there are 15,000 tribal people living in enclosures. Declaration of a tiger reserve will result in our relocation".

Law Minister P. Rajeev (CPI-M), Electricity Minister K. Krishnankutty (Janata Dal-Secular), Water Resources Minister Roshay Augustine (Kerala Congress-M) and Forest Minister A.K. Saseendran (Nationalist Congress Party).

Mr. Vijayan hinted that the government would def-

er any call on PM SHRI till after the local body polls. "We will all be busy in the coming months," he stated.

Asked whether the CPI (M) capitulated to the CPI for forsaking sizeable federal grants for school education, Mr. Vijayan said the people were aware of the LDF's credibility and no amount of tarnishing would rob the ruling front of its sheen.

CPI State secretary Binoy Viswam refused to portray the Cabinet decision as his party's victory. "The CPI does not view the situation through the narrow prism of victory or non-victory. The CPI(M) and CPI played a historic role in yet again authoring the victory of Left politics and ideology," he said.

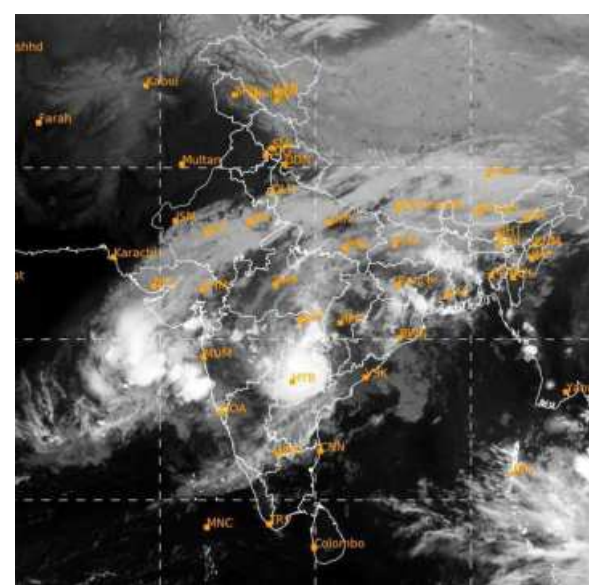
Pre-election move

Clearly, air travel, irrespective of its efficiency benefits, is the most climate-polluting way to travel," it said.

Uneven growth

Increasing incomes and creating jobs are a must to boost demand

The industrial production data for September is especially useful as it provides insights into longer periods such as the second quarter and the first half of the financial year. The news is not all bad, but there are areas that warrant attention. When looked at on a half-yearly basis, the IIP data for April-September 2025 show that industrial growth was the slowest in at least five years. At just 3%, the half-yearly growth is well below what it should be. However, quarterly growth shows that things are improving – Q2 growth was a more robust 4.1%, compared to 2% in Q1. The bright spot in all of this, at least on the surface, has been the manufacturing sector. In September, it grew by 4.8%, the second highest in this financial year. On a quarterly basis, the July-September 2025 quarter saw the manufacturing sector grow by a relatively strong 4.9%, the fastest quarterly growth it has seen since the quarter-ended December 2023. On a half-yearly basis, too, the sector's growth bounced back to 4.1% in the April-September 2025 half, after having slowed to 3.8% in the first half of the previous year. Activity in the mining sector contracted in September 2025, the second quarter, as well as in the first half of the financial year. While some of this can be attributed to the monsoon this year, this performance is still unusually poor. Strengthening the sector should be a priority to shore up India's energy and strategic mineral security.

The manufacturing sector's apparent strong performance, too, is not something that should be taken at face value. The data show that the growth is not broad-based, and is instead concentrated in some sectors. Of the 23 main manufacturing sub-sectors measured in the IIP, more than half contracted in the July-September 2025 quarter. Of concern is that labour-intensive sectors such as apparels, leather products, rubber products and plastics, all contracted in the September 2025 quarter. The sectors that grew included wood products, mineral products, basic metals and fabricated metal products, many of which are more capital intensive. If this trend persists, it could have negative implications for job creation, and warrants attention. The other troubling aspect of the data is that the consumer non-durables sector has contracted for the last six consecutive quarters. While some of these are essential items such as salt and edible oils, others are items of discretionary spending. Much of this is because of the base effect, but slack demand has been a problem that policymakers have been grappling with for some time. The only real solution lies in increasing incomes and creating jobs.

Federalism and funds

State autonomy cannot be bargaining point for availing central financing

Kerala sprang a surprise last week by signing up for the scheme, Prime Minister Schools for Rising India (PM SHRI), that dovetails the National Education Policy (NEP)-2020, to upgrade and brand 14,500 schools nationwide as model institutions. Kerala, one of the three States to oppose the NEP-2020 (the others being Tamil Nadu and West Bengal), on the contention that it sought to encroach on the subject of school education, which is in the Concurrent List, and infuse it with communal bias and anti-scientific content, was evidently looking to gain central funds. Earlier this year, Tamil Nadu had approached the Supreme Court of India after the Centre withheld funds under the Samagra Shiksha (SS) scheme over the State's refusal to adopt the NEP-PM SHRI framework. Kerala's agreement on adopting the scheme is now in freeze after strife within the ruling Left Democratic Front (LDF) soon after the government signed the PM SHRI Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with the Centre, without Cabinet approval – an issue deferred twice in Cabinet meetings. The CPI, a key LDF partner, demanded an immediate withdrawal. The CPI(M), which holds the general education portfolio, initially deferred the decision, arguing that enrolment in PM SHRI was necessary to avail of federal funds withheld under the SS, which had led to salary arrears for teachers and non-teaching staff. The CPI(M) clarified that Kerala remained opposed to the NEP-2020 and would retain control over its school curriculum. The allies reached a détente on Wednesday – a cabinet sub-committee will scrutinise the MoU. Implementation of PM SHRI will remain suspended until the subcommittee's recommendation. The Centre will be formally informed of this decision.

Kerala has long excelled in school education, achieving near-universal gross enrolment ratio, high retention rates, superior learning outcomes, and modern infrastructure – milestones that render many NEP-2020 targets redundant in the State. For Kerala, PM SHRI amounts to little more than cosmetic rebranding of already high-performing institutions, but the State would be forced to comply with provisions of the NEP-2020 for integration of 'Indian Knowledge Systems', which many reckon is a euphemism for pseudoscience. It is regrettable that the Centre withholds federal funds under the SS to arm-twist States into accepting NEP-2020 or PM SHRI. While Tamil Nadu has pursued legal redress, its case has not received the judicial urgency it warrants. In India's federal polity, the judiciary must robustly defend cooperative federalism whenever it is undermined. As Kerala pauses PM SHRI, it must consider litigation to secure its rightful share of central funds. Federalism and State autonomy cannot be bargaining points in the quest for funds.

An amended Constitution Bill, its contentious issues

The central government recently introduced the Constitution (One Hundred And Thirtieth Amendment) Bill in Parliament to amend Article 75, Article 164 and Article 239AA of the Constitution which pertain to the Union Council of Ministers, State Council of Ministers and the special administrative provisions for Delhi, respectively. The Bill has been referred to a Joint Parliamentary Committee.

The Bill provides that in case a Minister is arrested and detained in custody for 30 consecutive days, for an alleged offence punishable with imprisonment which may extend up to five years or more, he shall be removed from office by the President, on the advice of the Prime Minister, which is to be tendered by the 31st day of such custody. Or, he shall cease to be a Minister in case such advice is not tendered by then. A similar provision is provided for Ministers in State Assemblies, who shall be removed by the Governor on the advice of the Chief Minister. In the case of the Prime Minister and Chief Minister of a State, they are required either to tender their resignation by the 31st day or else shall (automatically) cease to be the Prime Minister or Chief Minister of a State.

What was contentious for the Opposition

The two contentious issues that forced the Opposition to come together against the Bill were 'arrest' by the police and authorising 'detention' by a court. Since, wide discretion lies with both, there needs to be scrutiny of the Bill to ensure that it is not misused.

The first parameter to remove a Minister is arrest, which is discretionary and in the hands of the enforcement agencies. While the Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita (BNS) provides for the enforcement of some conditions before there is an arrest for offences that are punishable for up to seven years of imprisonment, it is not mandatory for a police officer to arrest any person accused of commission of a cognisable offence that is punishable with imprisonment even for more than seven years.

The Madras High Court, in *Deenan vs Jayalalitha* (1989), refused to interfere in the police investigation when the petitioner pleaded before the High Court to use its inherent powers to direct the Commissioner of Police to arrest the respondent, Jayalalitha.

The High Court said that the words 'may arrest' under Section 41 showed that the power of arrest is discretionary and that a police officer is not always bound to make an arrest for cognisable offences. Though he has the power to arrest, he can refrain from arresting persons, depending upon the nature of the offence and the circumstances unfurled not only in the complaint but also during the course of investigation. The authorised power of arrest of an offender by a private person is restricted to cases of commission of non-bailable and cognisable offences in his presence and to the case of the

proclaimed offender, not otherwise.

In *Joginder Kumar vs State of U.P.* (1994), the Supreme Court of India observed that no arrest can be made only because a police officer is authorised to do so. The police officer must be able to justify the arrest. Arrest and detention in a police lock-up of a person can cause incalculable harm to the reputation and self-esteem of a person, the Court said.

In another case, *Amarawati And Anr. (Smt.) vs State Of U.P.* (2004), the Bench of the Allahabad High Court, after carefully examining the definition of 'cognisable offence', provisions of Section 41 and Section 157 of the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC), held that the Legislature has consciously used the words 'may arrest' and it was not mandatory for the police to make an arrest in a cognisable offence. Section 157 of the CrPC empowers the police to investigate a cognisable offence and arrest the accused, if required.

In 2009, in an amendment of Section 41 of the CrPC, some distinction was made for arrest in offences punishable with imprisonment extendable up to seven years and offences punishable with over seven years of imprisonment. However, Section 41A of the CrPC, which provides for issuing notice of appearance (when arrest of a person is not required), does not make a differentiation between offences based on their term of imprisonment. The Supreme Court, in *Satender Kumar Antil vs CBI and Anr.* (2022), held that the investigating agencies are bound to comply with the provisions of Section 41 and Section 41A CrPC. Section 35 of the BNS is *pari materia* to Sections 41 and 41A of the CrPC, read together.

There could be misuse

While the continuation of Ministers in the cabinet with serious criminal charges does not augur well for constitutional morality, the misuse of this discretionary power of arrest by the police to target leaders of the Opposition parties cannot be ruled out. High Courts have repeatedly taken objection for not following the directions issued in *Armesh Kumar vs State of Bihar and Another* (2014) which mandated that the investigating officer record reasons and material which necessitated the arrest. The National Police Commission (1977) in its third report observed that nearly 60% of the arrests were unnecessary or unjustified. Given such a scenario, where the police are alleged to be amenable to political pressure, 'arrest' may be used as a political tool to initiate the unseating of Ministers in Opposition parties.

The second parameter is continuous detention in custody for "thirty consecutive days", which signifies the importance of bail. If a Minister is able to obtain bail within this period, disqualification under Article 75(5A) would not operate. Though the Supreme Court has repeatedly reaffirmed the principle that 'bail is the rule, jail is the exception', bail is often

rejected for factors other than the triple test – i.e., flight risk, possibility of tampering with evidence, and threatening of witnesses. For instance, the gravity or seriousness of an offence is considered to be an important fourth factor, despite its conflict with the presumption of innocence of the accused. So, while bail may be granted in early stages in economic offences, it is extremely difficult in heinous offences unless the accused has undergone considerable incarceration.

The main issues

The new Amendment does not account for default bail under Section 167(2) CrPC (*pari materia* Section 187, BNS). Default bail is the right of an accused person when the investigation is not completed within 60 days to 90 days (depending on the gravity of the offence) of his custody. Since the cumulative period of police and judicial remand itself exceeds 30 days, the embargo under Article 75(5A) does not seem to be rational. It is true that remand is not mandatory jail time and needs to be extended by the court at intervals, but courts readily grant this extension within the outer limits of 60 days to 90 days.

Further, the phrase 'an offence under any law for the time being in force' includes complaints filed under special statutes such as PMLA (money laundering), NDPS (narcotics), and UAPA (unlawful activity). This is even more dangerous since all special statutes have the infamous twin conditions of bail that are not present in the CrPC/BNS. First, the accused must prove that he is not guilty of the offence, and second, that he would not commit an offence while on bail. As opposed to trial, these conditions must be satisfied at the stage of bail itself. They are often termed onerous and reverse the burden of proof from the prosecution to the accused. The Manish Sisodia case, where he was accused in the liquor policy scam, is a case in point – bail was granted 17 months after his incarceration under the PMLA. This being the norm for special statutes, the threshold of "thirty consecutive days" under the new Amendment Bill would be an abysmally low benchmark to cross. Removal from office would be extremely damaging.

Another factor which may hinder bail to a Minister is their ability to influence witnesses due to their position of power, which is considered significant to an investigation and trial. A Minister may be faced with a Hobson's choice – either continue or get bail. Staying on as a Minister would jeopardise bail and therefore mean removal under the amended provisions, while resigning would prevent him from carrying out ministerial duties even if bail was granted.

A last factor that makes bail uncertain and vulnerable is whether the judge concerned has a *pro* or *ante* liberty stance under Article 21. Leaving aside the objective facts of a case, this brings about enormous subjectivity and discretion in granting bail.

A decade after Paris accord, an unstoppable transition

Ten years after the adoption of the Paris Agreement at COP21, the planet faces unprecedented challenges. Despite a shared global pledge to limit global warming well below 2°C and keep the 1.5°C target within reach, emissions and temperatures continue to rise at alarming rates. The devastating consequences of climate change are already visible across the globe, including in India, as seen this year in Uttarakhand, Punjab and Jammu and Kashmir.

Yet, the Paris Agreement is delivering. Ten years ago, before the adoption of the Paris Agreement, the world was heading towards global warming of around 4°C-5°C by the end of the century. Through sustained commitment and concrete and collective action, this curve was altered to approximately 2°C-3°C. This remains far above what science deems sustainable, as underscored by the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC). But it demonstrates that collective action can have an impact on our collective trajectories and that multilateralism can work.

The Paris Agreement delivers because it is fair, just and promotes international solidarity with the countries most affected by the adverse impacts of climate change. It respects national circumstances and provides for differentiated levels of commitment.

A turning point

Throughout the decade, the Paris Agreement has been a powerful instrument that engaged the world's economy on the path to a low carbon transition. Ten years ago, the most competitive way to produce energy was fossil fuel use. It is no longer the case. Today, everywhere in the world, renewable energies such as wind, solar, hydroelectricity are driving growth and jobs. This marks tremendous progress for energy security and sovereignty.

Ten years ago, electric mobility seemed an elusive dream. Today, thanks to remarkable advances in battery technology and energy storage, electric vehicles represent nearly 20% of

global new car sales, heralding the drastic reduction of fossil fuels in transport, bringing also multiple co-benefits such as clean air to our cities. The scale of this transformation is monumental.

The impressive example of the solar alliance

The International Solar Alliance (ISA) is a striking example of the commitment by India and France to strong international multilateralism for climate progress.

Conceived at COP21 in Paris and jointly launched by Prime Minister Narendra Modi and then French President François Hollande, the ISA stands as a compelling embodiment of India and France's shared commitment to climate multilateralism. At the COP30 in Belém, France and India shared a joint vision: we needed this kind of alliance to transform the hope of the Paris Agreement into action.

Since its inception, the ISA has grown into a global coalition of more than 120 member and signatory countries, delivering concrete results through capacity building, training programmes and financial mechanisms supporting underfunded energy transitions. It was inspiring to witness first-hand the remarkable achievements of the ISA at its Eighth Assembly that this writer co-chaired on October 28, 2025, with India's Minister of New and Renewable Energy, Pralhad Joshi. The ISA's mission remains vital: to make solar energy accessible to all.

India has a strong commitment to renewable energies, more than half of which will come from solar. India aims to become the largest major economy to develop using a low-carbon pathway, fulfilling the vision of "Viksit Bharat" by 2047 and achieving net-zero carbon emission by 2070. This year, India has demonstrated leadership by achieving 50% of installed electricity capacity from non-fossil sources, five years ahead of the 2030 target.

These efforts must be sustained and expanded across all regions At COP30 in Belém, five priorities must guide the international community.

First, there must be agreement on a way to collectively raise global ambition to accelerate the reduction of carbon emissions. The world's collective efforts are still not sufficient and there is a need to accelerate efforts, for the world's people and its future.

Second, there must be a championing of a just and inclusive transition, placing vulnerable communities at its core. France devotes one-third of its climate finance to adaptation, contributing to the Green Climate Fund, the Loss and Damage Fund, and early warning systems such as CREWS. As co-chair of the Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure alongside India, France also advocates innovative, predictable climate finance such as global solidarity levies ahead of COP30.

Third, there must be a protection of natural carbon sinks – the world's forests, mangroves and oceans. From the Amazon to the Sundarbans, these ecosystems are the world's best allies in the fight against climate change.

Fourth, there must be an empowerment of non-state actors – local governments, businesses, scientists, philanthropies and citizens – to translate ambition into implementation. The broad engagement that defined COP21 must now deliver tangible results and have a real-world impact that benefits everyone.

Fifth, science must be defended by supporting the IPCC and fighting climate disinformation. Together with Brazil and other countries, France is working to ensure that facts and science, not fear, guide the global transition.

In perspective

The transformation initiated in Paris cannot be reversed. It may face obstacles, but it is unstoppable. Unstoppable because adaptation has become a necessity, not a choice. Unstoppable because industries are investing irreversibly. Unstoppable because local authorities are embedding sustainability into standards and investments. Unstoppable because multilateralism, despite challenges, will continue to deliver if the world continues to believe in it.

For Mayawati, a wasted opportunity

Her Lucknow rally was, in effect, old wine in an old bottle

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Early this month, the 19th death anniversary of Kanshi Ram, the founder of the Bahujan Samaj Party (BSP), turned into a show of numerical strength for party chief Mayawati. Tens of thousands of supporters trooped into Lucknow from parts of Uttar Pradesh, and many others came in from Punjab, Haryana, Bihar and Uttarakhand. It was difficult to ignore what was easily the most massive of Ms. Mayawati's rallies in almost a decade.

Her brother, Anand Kumar, and nephew, Akash Anand, stood with her and she spoke uninterrupted for an hour. Clearly still living under the fear of the imaginary clout of a diminished Congress in the State, she railed against dynastic politics. She ranted against the Samajwadi Party (SP), accusing it of selective amnesia when it came to the Dalits of U.P. She was riled up by the actions of upcoming Dalit leader Chandrashekhar Azad 'Ravan' and dubbed him an "opportunist".

She was not all fire and brimstone, however. When it came to the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP), particularly Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, she was graciousness personified, thanking him for maintaining the huge parks which were built during her time as Chief Minister (2007-12). She even contrasted Mr. Adityanath's actions with those of Mr. Yadav, painting the former largely in positive hues. If she spoke against the BJP, it was merely perfunctory in nature. She also launched into the same old diatribe of 'shadyantra' (conspiracy theory) by her politi-

cal opponents against 'Dalit ki beti' (daughter of Dalit). The biggest BSP rally of recent times was, in effect, old wine in an old bottle.

The BSP chief wasted an opportunity to start afresh. This was a chance for Ms. Mayawati to turn a new leaf and talk of emerging issues in the State and the country. She chose instead to duck the issue of the Special Intensive Revision exercise in Bihar, and steer clear of 'bulldozer politics', the row around the Prophet's birthday celebrations, and the recent cruelties against Dalits, particularly in Raebareli. She made little attempt to bring into focus unemployment or inflation, the struggle of zari workers, the carpet weavers, the lock manufacturers, the brassware workers, the kite 'manja' producers or even the closure of primary schools in the State. Or for that matter, custodial deaths and encounter killings.

This was an opportunity too to tell her supporters and detractors alike that she was not soft on Hindutva politics, a perception that has gained ground since 2014 as she has repeatedly been hitting out at the SP and Congress; the former has been out of power in the State since 2017, the latter has been in the Opposition at the Centre for more than a decade. All along, she has shied away from asking questions of the BJP, which is in power both at the State and

the Centre. It did not change a bit in Lucknow. She still painted the Opposition in not-so-favourable colours.

Worse, after speaking out against dynastic politics, Ms. Mayawati happily, even brazenly, anointed her nephew as heir apparent, asking the masses to show him the same love they once showered on her. Little did she realise that Mr. Anand is a successor to a kingdom which has long since ceased to exist. The party has no member in the Lok Sabha today and merely one in the 403-member U.P. Vidhan Sabha. For the supremacy of a party that does not matter in Delhi, Punjab, Madhya Pradesh, and Bihar, she was being unrealistic. For comparison, the Suheldev Bharatiya Samaj Party and the Nishad Party have six members each in the Assembly. With their dedicated though niche followers, they stay relevant.

Not so Ms. Mayawati. Once the most formidable voice of Jatavs and other marginalised groups, today she has ceded ground to Mr. Azad who is not only drawing under an umbrella the Scheduled Caste and Muslim voters, but also believes in boots-on-the-ground politics. Wherever there is an incident of cruelty towards Dalits or Muslims, he stands shoulder to shoulder with them. Mr. Anand is not to be found there. Worse, nobody questions his absence. That is a sign of irrelevance.

Indeed, the Lucknow rally, which was supposed to be a political renaissance of Ms. Mayawati, ended as an unheeded call for reformation. Mayawati-2025 is like a broken record. According to a survey of 25 countries, Indians are least aware of AI

Despite low awareness, Indians expressed the most confidence in government regulation

According to a Pew survey covering 25 countries, Indians have the lowest awareness about Artificial Intelligence (AI). The survey found that about 14% of Indians have heard of or read a lot about AI; and another 32% have read a little about it. Together, this share (46%) is the lowest among the countries surveyed.

Chart 1 shows the share of people who have heard of or read a lot or little about AI. At 46%, India's share is well below the 25-country median of 81%.

Although AI is a new technology that young adults are generally expected to know more about, only 19% of Indians aged 18-34 said they have heard of or read a lot about AI. This is the second lowest share in that age group among the 25 countries surveyed (Chart 2).

Consequently, Indians are also among the least concerned about the increasing use of AI in daily life. Close to 19% of them said the increasing use of AI in daily life makes them more concerned than excited. This share is one of the lowest among the countries surveyed (Chart 3).

Nearly 90% of Indians also said they trust that their country will regulate the use of AI effectively. This share is the highest among all the countries surveyed, and by a significant margin (Chart 4).

Wealthier countries tend to have a higher share of people who have heard a lot about AI. Around half the adults in Japan, Germany, France, and the U.S. said they have heard a lot about AI, compared to the 14% in India and 12% in Kenya. Chart 5 plots the share of people who said they have heard of or read a lot about AI against the GDP per capita of the countries.

Charts 1, 2, 3, and 4 display data for only selected countries out of the 25 surveyed, while Chart 5 includes figures for all countries.

AI awareness: survey results

The data for the charts are sourced from the Pew Research Center's 'How People Around the World View AI' (October 2025). For non-U.S. data, this analysis draws on nationally representative surveys of 28,333 adults conducted from January 8 to April 26, 2025. Countries are classified as either high- or middle-income based on categories from the World Bank that rely on per capita gross national income

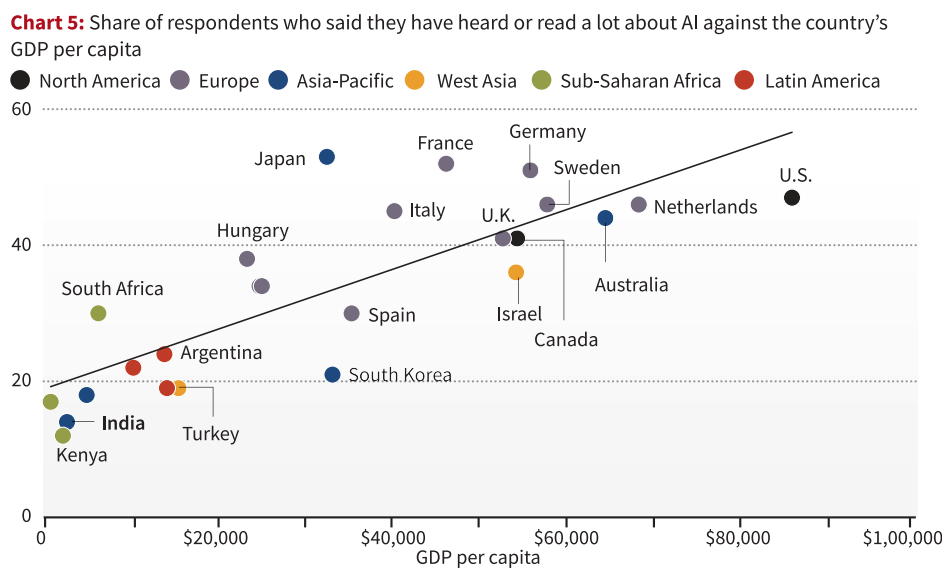
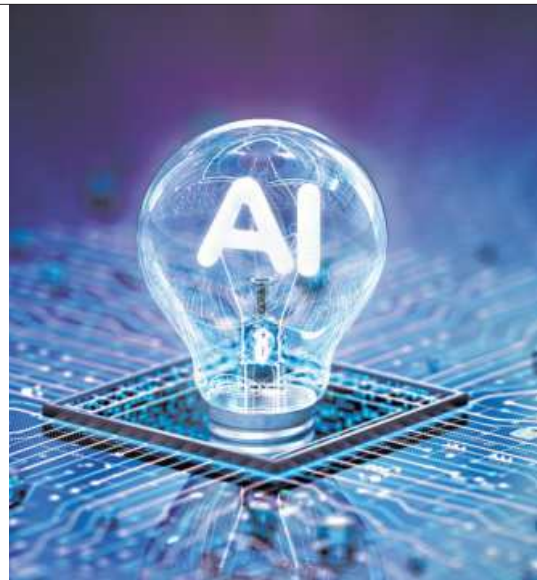


Chart 1: Country-wise share of respondents who said they have heard or read a lot or a little about AI. Figures in %

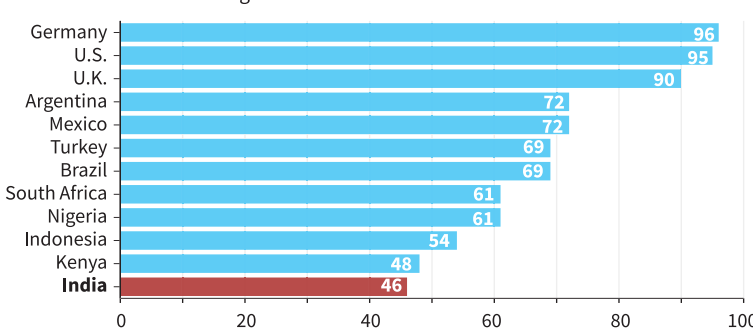


Chart 2: Country-wise share of respondents aged 18-34 who said they have heard or read a lot about AI. Figures in %

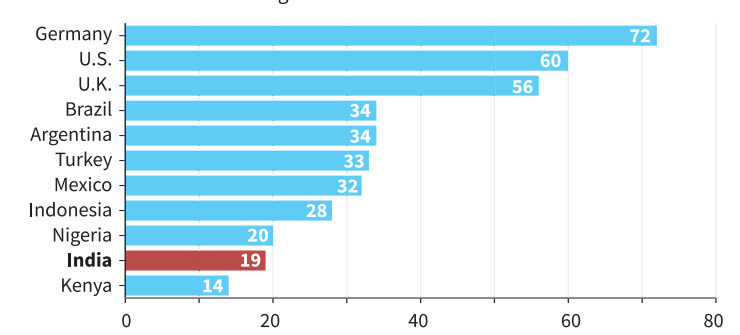


Chart 3: Country-wise share of respondents who said the increased use of AI in daily life makes them feel more concerned than excited

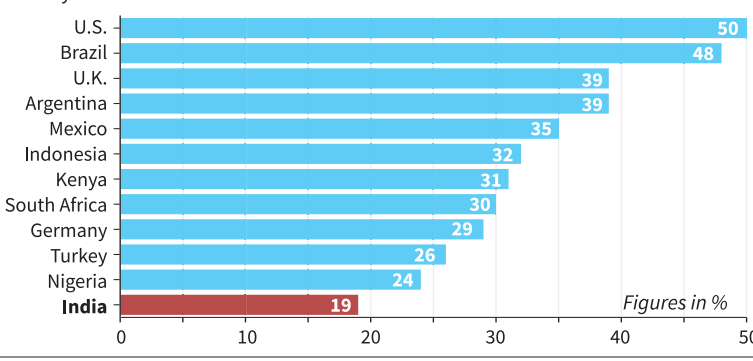
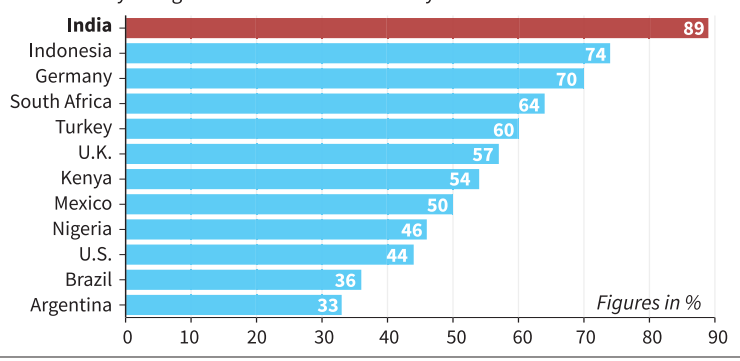


Chart 4: Country-wise share respondents who have some or a lot of faith in their country to regulate the use of AI effectively

'Terrorised' diplomats change their life styles

London, Oct. 29: Extremist action by an assortment of political crusaders has in the past decade transformed the lifestyles of hundreds of foreign diplomats accredited to the Court of St. James's in London. In the wake of murders, kidnappings and bomb attacks around the world, most envoys, and especially those with sensitive missions, live in peril even in London.

Some, like the Israelis, work in buildings fortified by barbed-wire entanglements behind electronically controlled sets of steel doors, floodlit at night, guarded round-the-clock by a posse of armed police. Others, including the Russians, Arabs and Israelis, have installed special alarm circuits which link them with the nearest police station in case of sudden attack. Certain key ambassadors, notably Mr. Elliot Richardson of the U.S., never move out of their offices or homes without an armed bodyguard or secret serviceman on hand. And virtually, every sizable foreign diplomatic mission here reinforces the protection given to it by the British authorities with its own internal security officers who invariably are armed.

The overworked British security services in the past few years have suspected that one terrorist group may sometimes link up with another. There is said to be some evidences in police dossiers, for example, that the militant provisional wing of the Irish Republican Army (IRA) has at times worked with the Palestine Liberation Organisation (PLO).

A consequence of the ever-rising peril for foreign envoys was a British police decision last year to form a 'diplomatic protection unit' within its special branch. The unit consists mainly of uniformed men in flying motorcycle or automobile squads who rush to the scene upon receipt of an alarm signal from any given embassy.

'FTA talks with EU crossed halfway mark'

The Minister has returned from a three-nation tour over the last week or so, having visited Geneva for the 16th session of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD), Berlin for the Berlin Global Dialogues, and Brussels to "further our negotiations with the European Union" for an FTA.

He further said that, on an increasing number of issues, the two teams are moving towards convergence. The team from the EU is set to visit New Delhi next week for the next round of negotiations, and Mr. Sefcovic will visit the capital at the end of November or in December, the Minister said.

On the question of whether negotiations on the FTA with the EU would be completed by the end of the calendar year, a target set by Prime Minister Narendra Modi and President of the European Commission Ursula von der Leyen in February, Mr. Goyal said that the priority was a "good deal" rather than meeting deadlines.

Cyclone Montha leaves 2 dead, flattens crops

The Narsapuram coast, where the landfall happened, saw no major damage. West Godavari Collector Chadalavada Nagarani said: "The Narsapuram coast did not witness any major loss. However, 268 trees, mostly coconut, collapsed. Nearly 100 more trees are believed to have uprooted. The National Disaster Response Force personnel are removing those trees from the roads".

However, Uppadareported heavy losses. As many as 61 houses were damaged. Kakinada Collector S. Shan Mohan said: "No human loss has been reported along the Kakinada coast. Crops on more than 5,500 acres have been damaged and 51 km of roads have also been damaged".

At the Kumbabhishekam fish landing point near Kakinada Deepsea port, Gaddepalli Sairam, a fisherman hailing from Dummulpeta is feared to have drowned in the sea. The NDRF personnel have intensified the search.

Two districts, SPSR Nellore and Prakasam, received extremely heavy rainfall. In total, 27 stations in the State, most of them in Prakasam, SPSR Nellore, and Bapatla, recorded 10 cm and more during the 24-hour period ending at 8.30 a.m. on Wednesday.

Israel resumes ceasefire after strikes kill 104

It accused Israel of "a blatant violation of the ceasefire deal". Hamas also said it would delay handing over the body of another hostage to Israel because of the strikes.

U.S. President Donald Trump, on a trip to Asia, defended the strikes, saying Israel was justified in carrying them out after Hamas killed the Israeli soldier, who also held U.S. citizenship.

Mr. Netanyahu on Monday called the return of body parts a "clear violation" of the ceasefire agreement, which requires Hamas to return all the remains of hostages in Gaza as soon as possible.

Israel's Foreign Ministry spokesperson Oren Marmorstein said Washington the strikes were carried out in full coordination with the U.S.

Hamas replied in kind on Wednesday, saying the Israeli strikes reveal "a clear Israeli intention to undermine the ceasefire agreement and impose new realities by force." The group also said in a statement that the U.S. is offering Mr. Netanyahu a "political cover" to carry on with its aggression in Gaza. Hamas has said it is struggling to locate the bodies of the hostages amid the vast destruction in Gaza, while Israel has accused the militant group of purposely delaying their return.

500 Indians in Thailand will be repatriated

The cross-border cyber fraud hubs have become a major issue for the Thai Prime Minister, who said shutting down these hubs is a national security priority for Thailand. In a meeting of the National Steering Committee on the Prevention and Suppression of Technology-related Crimes held in Bangkok on October 20, Mr. Charnvirakul described the cross-border online scam industry as a threat to Thailand's economic stability.

The Myanmar military has been carrying out repeated raids against the KK Park cyber crime hub, prompting around 1,500 people of multiple nationalities to cross into Thailand over the past week. A large number of cyber fraud outfits have set up bases along the Myanmar-Thailand border and in the Cambodia-Laos region, taking advantage of the civil conflict in Myanmar and lax local laws. Many of them are known to use U.S. billionaire Elon Musk's Starlink satellite network to bypass local authorities.

Fake job offers trap Indians

Earlier this year, the Indian Air Force carried out an airlift operation repatriating 283 Indians who had been "lured to various southeast Asian countries, including Myanmar with fake job offers", according to the MEA.

Indian maritime sector has seen historic progress: Modi

PM launches initiatives worth ₹2.2 lakh crore for shipping and shipbuilding sectors at Maritime Leaders' Conclave; amid global tensions, India represents autonomy and inclusive growth, he says

The progress in India's maritime domain has been historic and the capability of major ports has doubled, Prime Minister Narendra Modi said on Wednesday.

"Cargo movement has increased 700% in inland areas. Today, India's ports are considered among the best in the developing world," he added.

Mr. Modi was speaking at the Maritime Leaders' Conclave held at the NESCO Ground to mark 'India Maritime Week'.

"When the global seas are rough, the world looks for a steady lighthouse. India can play that role very strongly. Amid global tensions, India represents autonomy and inclusive growth," Mr. Modi said, hinting at the prevailing global trade headwinds.

During the event, Mr. Modi launched initiatives worth ₹2.2 lakh crore for the shipping and shipbuilding sectors, including acquisition of 437 vessels.

Several memoranda of understanding (MoUs) for port-led industrialisation, sustainability, and shipbuilding, among others, were signed.

Sign of confidence

"In 2016, the maiden India Maritime Week was held in Mumbai. Today, it has become a global summit. Eighty-five countries participate in it today. This itself sends a very big message," Mr. Modi said.

"The MoUs signed here show the confidence of the

world in India's maritime capabilities."

"This [2025] is a crucial year for the country's maritime capabilities. The Vizhinjam deep water transit hub has been operational. It is a matter of pride for every Indian. Kandla port and the Jawaharlal Nehru Port Trust (JNPT) have shown great capabilities. The JNPT's handling capability has doubled, making it India's biggest container port," he added.

Speaking about reforms undertaken by the govern-

ment to improve shipping and port efficiency and safety, Mr. Modi said, "We are taking big steps. Modern and futuristic laws have been implemented and old laws scrapped. They strengthen sustainability and enhance digitisation in ports. The safety of our ports has increased and ease of business has improved."

Logistics performance

Praising logistics performance of Indian ports, Mr. Modi said, "In the Logistics Performance Index of the World Bank, India had performed better."

"Shipbuilding is our top priority too. India is making great strides in shipbuilding," he said, adding, "New alternatives for finance and easy credit will be offered."

"We welcome your ideas, innovation and investment. Public-Private Partnerships [PPP] have been increasing. We are giving incentives to States to attract investment," he told the attendees at the conclave.

India, China hold fresh round of talks on border peace

The Indian and Chinese militaries held a fresh round of high-level talks aimed at maintaining peace and security along the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in eastern Ladakh.

It was the first such interaction between the two militaries after the Special Representatives' talks in August between National Security Adviser Ajit Doval and Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi.

According to the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA), the 23rd round of India-China Corps Commander-level meeting was held on October 25 at the Chushul-Moldo border meeting point.

This was the first meeting of the General Level Mechanism in the Western Sector since the 24th round of Special Representatives' talks held on August 19. The discussions, the Ministry said, were held in a "friendly and cordial atmosphere".

The Ministry added that both sides had reviewed the progress since the 22nd

round of Corps Commander-level Meeting held in October 2024 and shared the view that peace and tranquillity have been maintained in the border areas. The two sides agreed to continue using existing mechanisms to resolve any issues on the ground and to maintain stability along the LAC.

The Chinese Ministry of National Defence also confirmed the talks, stating that "the two sides engaged in active and in-depth communication on the management of the western section of the China-India border".

The latest round of talks comes amid ongoing efforts by both nations to sustain dialogue and prevent incidents along the contested frontier, where disengagement efforts have been under way since 2020.

President takes sortie in Rafale fighter jet, calls it 'unforgettable experience'

President Droupadi Murmu on Wednesday took a sortie in a Rafale fighter jet from the Indian Air Force Station in Ambala, and described the experience as "unforgettable", and one that instilled a "renewed sense of pride" in India's defence capabilities.

Ms. Murmu made history as she became the first President of India to fly in two different fighter aircraft of the Indian Air Force. Previously, she undertook a sortie in a Sukhoi 30 MKI, in April 2023, from Tezpur in Assam.

Donning a G-suit and sporting sunglasses, Ms. Murmu, who is also the Commander-in-Chief of the Indian armed forces, was seen posing for pictures and flashing a thumbs-up gesture before the French-made jet, flown by Group Captain Amit Gehani, Commanding Officer

of the 17 Squadron, took off at 11.27 a.m. The sortie lasted approximately 30 minutes, covering about 200 km. The aircraft reached a height of about 15,000 feet above sea level, and a speed of approximately 700 kmph, according to a statement from the President's office.

Upon landing, the President shared her delight in the visitor's book. "The sortie on Rafale is an unforgettable experience for me. This first flight on the potent Rafale aircraft has

instilled in me a renewed sense of pride in the nation's defence capabilities. I congratulate the Indian Air Force," she wrote.

Air Chief Marshal A.P. Singh also flew a sortie in a separate aircraft from the same air base.

Upon arrival in Ambala, the President was accorded a ceremonial guard of honour. Prior to the flight, Ms. Murmu was pictured with Squadron Leader Shivangi Singh, the country's first woman Rafale fighter jet pilot.

Top court allows Angmo to launch a keener challenge to Wangchuk's detention

The Supreme Court on Wednesday allowed Gitanjali J. Angmo to launch a keener challenge against the Centre for detaining her husband and climate activist Sonam Wangchuk under the National Security Act.

In her application seeking amendment of her earlier petition, Ms. Angmo alleged that the Union Home Ministry had nursed "strong reservations" about Mr. Wangchuk's inclusion in the High-Powered Committee delegation of the Leh Apex Body and Kargil Democratic Alliance formed to hold talks with the government on the issues of Statehood and Sixth Schedule safeguards for Ladakh.

She denied that Mr. Wangchuk used the platform of protest to target the government, noting that "such allegations sur-

facated for the first time only in the last two months, August and September 2025, which immediately resulted in notices and actions against his institutions, including cancellation of land leases, CBI investigation, FCRA cancellation, Income Tax summons, and other proceedings".

Ms. Angmo accused the detaining authority of "malicious intent", pointing out that state action began suddenly just two months before the Ladakh Autonomous Hill Develop-

ment Council, Leh, elections, scheduled for October 2025 and at a time when Mr. Wangchuk publicly raised the issue of fulfilling the Sixth Schedule promises made during the 2020 elections.

Mr. Wangchuk was detained on September 26 under the NSA following violent protests on September 24 in Leh. He was shifted to the Jodhpur Central Jail in Rajasthan.

"The brazen allegation that Mr. Sonam Wangchuk has acted as chief provocateur in the violent protest that took place on 24 September 2025 is false, malicious and fabricated and entirely contrary to the material on record... On the contrary, Mr. Sonam Wangchuk has made significant contributions in support of national security and the Armed Forces," Ms. Angmo said.

The court scheduled the case to hear the Centre's response on November 24.

Japan's new PM calls Modi, discusses Quad, economic and security issues

India and Japan would like to open a "golden chapter" in their ties, said Japan's Prime Minister Sanae Takaichi, who held her first conversation with Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Wednesday, a week after she took office. The conversation, which lasted about 25 minutes, focused on the Quad, economic and defence cooperation, and the mobility of professionals, both sides said.

In a post, Mr. Modi said he had discussed their "shared vision for advancing the India-Japan Special Strategic and Global Partnership, indicating India and Japan will move forward with the initiatives and agreements signed during Mr. Modi's visit to



Japan in August. Mr. Modi had then met with Ms. Takaichi's predecessor Shigeru Ishiba, who subsequently had to resign from office.

The Japanese Prime Minister's office said that Ms. Takaichi stated that India and Japan share "fundamental values and strategic interests".

"Japan intends to continue to work together toward realizing a Free and Open Indo-Pacific, including through Japan-Austra-

lia-India-U.S.," it said in statement, adding that Japan will continue its cooperation with India on security, economy, investment, innovation, and people-to-people exchanges. In a post responding to Mr. Modi on social media, Ms. Takaichi said that she would like to open a "new golden chapter in the Japan-India Special Strategic and Global Partnership", along with Mr. Modi.

The new Japanese Prime Minister has met many of her Asian and Indo-Pacific counterparts already, as she attended the ASEAN summit in Kuala Lumpur last week, that Mr. Modi pulled out of. Ms. Takaichi will be in Gyeongju in South Korea for the Asia Pacific Economic Cooperation Summit on Thursday.

When asked about whether she will meet Chinese President Xi Jinping, who will hold a summit with U.S. President Donald Trump on Thursday morning, Chief Cabinet Secretary Minoru Kihara said that her schedule is still being finalised.

The conversation between the two Prime Ministers came a day after Mr. Trump's visit to Japan, when Ms. Takaichi had also referenced the Quad.

BIHAR ASSEMBLY ELECTION

MLA among 10 expelled by RJD for rebellion

The RJD in Bihar on Wednesday expelled 10 of its leaders, including an MLA who is contesting the Assembly election against the party's official candidate after being denied a nomination. RJD State president Mangani Lal Mandal said that Phate Bahadur Singh, the MLA for Dehri, and nine others had

been expelled for "anti-party activities". The list of expelled leaders includes State vice-president Satish Kumar and former MLAs Gulam Jilani Warsi and Reyazul Haq Raju. This comes two days after the expulsion of 27 leaders, including two sitting MLAs and five former legislators. BJP IT cell head Amit Malviya shared the latest list of leaders expelled from the RJD on X and said, "At this rate, the party will soon be left without any workers as well as voters." PTI

'Nitish's CM post unsure, BJP not consulting him'

Former Rajasthan Chief Minister Ashok Gehlot on Wednesday said that winning the Bihar Assembly election was crucial not only for the Mahagatbandhan (Grand Alliance) but also for the country. He took a dig at Janata Dal(U) chief Nitish Kumar's relationship with the BJP in Bihar. He said, "...Nitish

Kumar changed alliances... which tarnished his image. He was once a prime ministerial candidate, but today, even the BJP isn't consulting him properly." Mr. Gehlot, the Congress observer for the State, said, "The BJP, whether it's Amit Shah or any other leader, keeps saying things like 'We will see who will become the CM after the elections.' So, he was once thinking about becoming the PM, and now, whether he will become the Chief Minister or not... this is the situation." PTI

Fresh from campus politics, Dhananjay gets into the big ring

Months after completing his tenure as the Jawaharlal Nehru University Students' Union (JNUSU) president, Dhananjay says his tenure, combined with his experience as a migrant student in Delhi, has brought him where he is today: contesting the Bihar Assembly election.

Originally from Gaya, Mr. Dhananjay became the first Dalit president of the JNUSU in 27 years, and is now contesting from the Bhoirey (Scheduled Caste reserved) constituency, which will go to the polls in Phase 1 on November 6.

Associated with the All India Students' Union (AISA) since 2015, he is contesting from the Communist Party of India (Marxist-Leninist) Liberation, a constituent of the Grand Alliance in Bihar. Mr. Dhananjay is up against Sunil Kumar from the Janata Dal(U), to whom the party had narrowly lost this seat in the previous election by 462 votes.

While his journey into politics is heavily rooted in student politics, he does not conflate the two but addresses the similarities: "The people for whom I am in politics today, their children study in JNU. The issues in JNU were linked to what is happening back at home. On one hand, in JNU, we raise our voice for national and international issues. Here, there is class and caste, people struggling for two rotis..."

In 2024, he was elected JNUSU president. Whether it was understanding students' problems and addressing their issues - ranging from mosquito infestations to the need for sanitary napkin-vending machines - he says he learnt how to address people's issues.

Back in school, he would read newspapers and discuss issues with friends, but did not know much about the right or the left. When he came to the Delhi University (DU), he became associated with the AISA's fight against the implementation of the Four-Year Undergraduate Programme (FYUP). He did his Bachelor's degree in DU, MA from Ambedkar University, Delhi, M.Phil. and now Ph.D. from the School of Arts and Aesthetics of the JNU.

His experience as a student was what eventually pulled him in: "As migrant students, the situation at home might not be great, we didn't speak good English and we were left behind in many aspects, be it social, economic or cultural. We wanted to speak up but hesitated due to our class and caste status." He added that the AISA represented such students, which is what connected him to the organisation.

He is currently pursuing his Ph.D. thesis on Mushaira as a performance art, where he explores the idea of secularism in Mushaira and how it is changing under the current political scenario.

Domicile policy

While student issues feature in his campaign, there are other issues which he wants to address if elected. Speaking about the domicile policy in school teachers' appointment, which will give priority to youth who have studied in the State, he says, "What about those people who did not study here because of the bad state of education, like myself. Will they not get jobs?"

Other issues he wants to address include debt relief up to ₹2 lakh for women who have taken loans from microfinance institutions, and compensation for farmers whose crops have been damaged due to natural disasters.

His father is a retired policeman and his mother a homemaker. As JNUSU president, he worked for revoking a manual that imposes strict fines on students for protesting, among other issues.

Nitish just a facade of BJP, says Rahul; CM, PM posts not vacant for sons: Shah

Congress leader says BJP remote-controlling Nitish Kumar government in State; CM failed to provide basic needs of Biharis despite 20 years in power, he adds; Home Minister calls Mahagatbandhan a thugbandhan; accuses RJD, Congress of being corrupt, promoting dynastic politics

Congress and BJP leaders flung insults at each other in poll-bound Bihar on Wednesday in a busy day of campaigning for political bigwigs, a week ahead of the first phase of voting.

Congress leader Rahul Gandhi kicked off his election campaign in Muzaffarpur, where he accused the BJP of "remote-controlling the Chief Minister Nitish Kumar-led government in Bihar".

At a rally in Darbhanga, senior BJP leader and Union Home Minister Amit Shah asserted that there was "no vacancy for either the PM or CM post" for Rahul Gandhi or Rashtriya Janata Dal leader Tejashwi Yadav. In Siwan, Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath mocked Osama Shahab, the RJD candidate from Raghunathpur, saying that he was "as good as his name".

Over Nitish's leadership

Addressing a public meeting amid intermittent rain in Muzaffarpur, Mr. Gandhi pitted the Chief Minister and his Janata Dal (United) party against their main allies in the ruling NDA.

"Nitish Kumar's face is being used while the remote control lies in the hands of the BJP," he said, sharing the stage with Mr. Yadav, the Chief Ministerial candidate of the Opposi-

tion INDIA bloc. "You should not think the voice of even most Backward Class people is heard here. In fact, three-four people control the government through remote. The BJP controls it... Chief Minister Nitish Kumar's leadership is only a facade as the real power lies in the hands of the BJP," he added.

The Congress leader claimed that the ruling NDA has no "commitment" to social equality. He recalled how he had once demanded a nationwide caste census from Prime Minister Narendra Modi in the Lok Sabha.

"He did not say a single word... The BJP is against social justice, they do not want it," he said. However, the Union government later decided to count the population by caste during the next Census.

Despite two decades of a Nitish Kumar-led government, "the people of Bihar

have been denied progress", Mr. Gandhi said.

"Biharis have no future in Bihar and this is your truth," he added.

"Nitish Kumar has failed to deliver even on basic needs. Tell me what he has done on the fronts of health, education, and employment in the State in the last 20 years? Do you want a State where you get nothing?" he asked the crowd before answering the question himself.

"We don't want such a Bihar. We want a Bihar where there is health, education, and employment."

"*Ek taraf natak Ambani, Adani ka Hindustan Narendra Modi ka, aur doosri taraf Hindustan ki sachchayee: ganda paani aur bimari* (On one side, there is the drama of Ambani, Adani - the country is of Narendra Modi, while on the other hand, there is the stark reality of the country: dirty water and disease)," the

Congress leader said. He also promised a shift from "made in China" to "made in Bihar" products to boost local employment and industry in the State.

Different narrative

It was a different narrative in the Alinagar constituency of north Bihar's Darbhanga district, where Mr. Shah accused the Opposition of indulging in dynastic politics. "RJD chief Lalu Prasad wants to make his son Tejashwi Yadav the Chief Minister of Bihar and Congress leader Sonia Gandhi wants her son Rahul Gandhi to be the Prime Minister but both the posts of PM and CM are not vacant," he said.

Terming the Opposition's Mahagatbandhan (grand alliance) a "thugbandhan (alliance of frauds)", Mr. Shah accused the RJD chief of being involved in fodder, bitumen, and land-for-job scams,

while the Congress was embroiled in corruption cases worth ₹12 lakh crore.

Referring to the Union government's 2022 ban and arrest of members of the Popular Front of India (PFI), a radical outfit, Mr. Shah asked the gathered crowd: "Do you think the RJD will let PFI members remain in jail if they come to power in Bihar?"

Welfare measures

He listed the NDA government's measures for the welfare of Biharis.

"The NDA government provides free ration to 8.52 crore people in Bihar, constituted a Mahkana Board here, and provides 125 units of free electricity to domestic consumers... An airport and All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) have already been built here, now Darbhanga will soon get a metro rail too," he announced, calling for louder applause.

"The NDA government gave official status to Maithili and the Constitution has been translated into the language and a ₹500 crore centre is being constructed in the region to conserve the rich manuscripts of Mithila. A temple for Goddess Sita is also being constructed in the region and all the places she had visited will be connected with the upcoming Ram Circuit," Mr. Shah added, outlining efforts to promote Bihar language, culture, and tourism.

'As good as his name'

At another meeting at Raghunathpur in Siwan, the Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister slammed the RJD's candidature of Osama Shahab, son of former Siwan MP and strongman Mohammad Shahabuddin.

"His entry into the poll fray is like the return of Babar and Aurangzeb," he quipped.

"I was surprised at the name of the candidate when I entered into Raghunathpur constituency. The RJD has fielded a candidate whose name is identical to a person nationally and internationally known for his criminal tendencies. Look at the name Osama Shahab, he is as good as his name," Mr. Adityanath said.

"It may suit parties like the Congress, RJD, and Samajwadi Party to bow before the mafia, visit the tomb of Babar and Aurangzeb to offer prayers, but this does not befit a true Indian," he added.

RJD has defamed Bihar across world through misgovernance, says Rajnath

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh on Wednesday criticised Pakistan for failing to mend its ways, and said a "sizeable number of militants have been neutralised during Operation Sindoor".

"You have seen how even after our surgical strikes they did not learn their lessons. Terrorists from Pakistan targeted Indian citizens, tourists who had simply gone there [Pahalgam] to enjoy the beauty of Kashmir and they were killed after being asked about their religion," Mr. Singh said at a public meeting in Darbhanga in poll-bound Bihar.

Mr. Singh said India did not believe in the "politics of division".

"We do not do politics based on caste or religion... our politics is based on justice and humanity," he said, adding that India's response to the Pahalgam attack was both decisive and moral.

"When we launched Operation Sindoor, our goal

was clear, to target terrorist camps across the border. They killed our people after asking their religion, we targeted only those responsible for terror," he said.

"India considers the whole world as one family believing in the mantra Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam... Our sages never taught us hatred rather they taught compassion," he added. Mr. Singh praised Prime

Minister Narendra Modi for "restoring India's pride and stature on the global stage".

He also credited Mr. Modi for granting "constitutional status" to the OBC (Other Backward Classes) Commission, and accused the Opposition Mahagatbandhan (Grand Alliance) in Bihar of "misleading people with unrealistic promises".

"It was Prime Minister Narendra Modi and not Rahul Gandhi who gave constitutional status to OBC commission. BJP-led government has always respected the Backward Classes through solid action rather than mere rhetoric."

He claimed that ₹15 lakh crore had been allocated for the all-round development of Bihar in the past 11 years under the Narendra Modi government.

Recalling how Mr. Modi transferred money directly to the bank accounts of women and farmers of the country, he said, "When Prime Minister Narendra Modi transferred money directly into women's bank accounts, did he ever ask if

she was a Hindu or Muslim? Similarly, when assistance was given to farmers, did he see their religion?"

"No, every Indian benefited, and this is the spirit of this nation," he said.

Slamming the Rashtriya Janata Dal, the senior BJP leader said the Opposition party "has defamed Bihar across world through its past record of corruption and misgovernance".

He said the Opposition's election promise of providing a government job to every household was "unrealistic and misleading". "RJD has made unrealistic promise of providing government job to each household in Bihar. This is not practical governance rather, it's a politics of deception," he said.

"Issues in this Assembly election in Bihar is clear: whether the State will be taken back to the jungle raj days or it will remain on the path of development," he said, announcing that the National Democratic Alliance would release its manifesto on October 30 and "implement every single word in it".

Amid poll fever, a missing motorcycle and a happy ending

A story with a rocky start found an "unexpectedly" happy ending in Bihar. It began on August 27, when Congress leader Rahul Gandhi was in Darbhanga during his 14-day 'Voter Adhikar Yatra' in Bihar, at which time his party colleagues organised a motorcycle rally to neighbouring Muzaffarpur, 52 km away.

Mr. Gandhi's security personnel, after having tea at Maa Durga Line Hotel on National Highway 27, allegedly took the four-year old motorcycle of Suman Saurabh, 21, the owner of the hotel. The two-wheeler was never returned, sending Mr. Saurabh on a desperate hunt for the vehicle. "My lifeline was suddenly snapped," Mr. Saurabh said, recalling how he knocked on all possible doors to no avail.

Three days later, he received a call from Chhattisgarh Congress MLA Devendra Yadav. "He asked me to

come to Patna by 7 a.m. on September 1 to take the keys of a new motorcycle from Rahul Gandhi-ji," Mr. Saurabh said.

He, along with his father and others reached Patna on time, where Mr. Gandhi met him and handed over the keys to a new Bajaj Pulsar, which he collected from a store in the Boring Road area. "I was thrilled as something unexpected and unprecedented had happened. I am thankful to Rahul Gandhi-ji for understanding my concern. The bike costs more than ₹1.5 lakh, which is a big sum for me," he said

Delhi HC quashes 17-year-old case against Madhu Kishwar

The Delhi High Court has quashed a 17-year-old attempt to murder case against academic and activist Madhu Kishwar, observing that the FIR was "maliciously motivated". The order, passed on October 16, came while allowing Ms. Kishwar's plea seeking to quash an FIR lodged against her in June 2008 for offences of attempt to murder, voluntarily causing hurt, and criminal intimidation under the erstwhile Indian Penal Code. Justice Amit Mahajan said "the subject FIR appears to be in the nature of a defence and a maliciously motivated counterblast ... for wreaking vengeance upon the petitioner."

Urdu is the most beautiful language, says Kiren Rijju

Union Minister for Minority Affairs Kiren Rijju, on Wednesday, termed Urdu "the most beautiful language in the world". Speaking at the 105th foundation day of the Jamia Milia Islamia University, he also stressed that harmony between Hindus and Muslims was vital for India's progress and unity. "I don't know much of Urdu, but I can say that Urdu is the most beautiful language in the world," he said while praising the songs played at varsity's auditorium. He noted that among the six minorities, Muslims were the biggest community. He added that country cannot develop without Hindu-Muslim harmony.

Rahul promises support to family of deceased doctor

Leader of the Opposition in the Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi on Wednesday spoke to the family of a 28-year-old woman doctor from Maharashtra's Satara district, who allegedly died by suicide after sexual assault and harassment. He assured them of full support in their fight for justice. The conversation was facilitated by Maharashtra Congress president Harshwardhan Sapkal, who visited the family in Kavadgaon village in Beed district. Indian Youth Congress president Uday Bhanu also joined the interaction. Mr. Gandhi reportedly told the parents that Congress stands firmly with them and justice will be ensured at any cost.

Case against Cong. for singing Bangladesh anthem: Himanta

Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Wednesday said he had instructed the police to register a case of treason against Congress leaders in Sribhum district for singing the national anthem of Bangladesh at a party meeting. "The Congress meeting started with the singing of Bangladesh's national anthem instead of the Indian national anthem," he said. Mr. Himanta also alleged that singing the anthem was the Opposition party's endorsement of the claim by a section of leaders in Bangladesh that the entire northeast region was part of the neighbouring nation. Meanwhile, the State Congress claimed that the BJP was creating an "unnecessary controversy".

U.N. report on Myanmar 'blinkered', says India

India has strongly condemned what it described as a "blinkered analysis" made against it in a United Nations report on Myanmar's human rights situation, even as it reiterated its call for an immediate cessation of violence and inclusive political dialogue in the neighbouring country.

Delivering India's statement during the Interactive Dialogue on the human rights situation in Myanmar at the Third Committee of the UN General Assembly on Tuesday, Lok Sabha member Dilip Saikia said New Delhi continues to support all initiatives aimed at fostering a "Myanmar-owned and Myanmar-led path" toward peace, and democracy.

"We reiterate our consistent position calling for an immediate cessation of violence, release of political prisoners, unhindered delivery of humanitarian assistance," he said. Strongly criticising the remarks made by the UN Special Rapporteur, he said, "I express serious objections to the baseless and biased observation about country."

PM afraid to counter Trump's claims on ending war: Rahul

Congress leader says the Prime Minister must find the courage to respond; when he comes to Bihar, he should state that Trump is lying

The Congress on Wednesday targeted Prime Minister Narendra Modi over U.S. President Donald Trump repeating his claim that he stopped the conflict between India and Pakistan using trade, with Leader of the Opposition in the Lok Sabha Rahul Gandhi saying that the Prime Minister was "scared" of Mr. Trump.

Mr. Gandhi, addressing his first election rally in Bihar's Darbhanga, said Mr. Modi must find the courage to respond and when he comes to Bihar next, he should state that Mr. Trump was lying.

He said the U.S. President had claimed 50 times that he stopped Operation Sindoor by threatening the Prime Minister, who "hasn't uttered a word". Mr. Gandhi said those who lacked the courage could not develop Bihar.

"Mr. Trump is insulting him [Mr. Modi] daily in different countries. He says Mr. Modi has no guts and he has made him bow before him. Mr. Modi never once said Mr. Trump is speaking nonsense and lying," the Opposition leader said, adding, "One who cannot tell the American President on his face 'you are lying', he cannot do anything in Bihar".

In a post on X later, Mr. Gandhi said, "Mr. Trump is insulting Mr. Modi in country after country. Latest is South Korea. 1. Repeated that he used trade to fright-

en Mr. Modi into stopping Operation Sindoor. 2. Said 7 planes were shot down. Don't be scared Modi ji, find the courage to respond".

On his X handle, Congress general secretary in-charge (communications) Jairam Ramesh shared video clips of Mr. Trump's remarks in Japan and later in South Korea in which he repeated his claim that he stopped the India-Pakistan military conflict using trade. In his post, Mr. Ramesh said "the self-styled but now thoroughly shrunken 56-inch chest is still quiet". "So far he has said it 54 times. He has said it in the U.S., Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Egypt, and the U.K. He has said it mid-flight and on land. Now President Trump has said it again, while addressing business leaders in Japan last evening. No wonder his good friend in New Delhi does not want to hug him any more," Mr. Ramesh said.

Pay panel's terms of reference too rigid, says AITUC leader

The All India Trade Union Congress (AITUC) said here on Wednesday that the eighth Central Pay Commission (CPC) should do justice to government employees and pensioners. Criticising the delay in announcing the CPC, AITUC general secretary Amarjeet Kaur said though the decision to constitute the CPC was announced ahead of the Delhi Assembly election in January, it took 10 months for the Centre to constitute the panel. She said the decision went to cold storage and now it was being announced a few days ahead of the Bihar election.

"It took 10 months for [Prime Minister] Narendra Modi-led government to nominate a chairperson and a part-time member for the Commission. The Commission has been given 18 months' time to submit its report to the government, which means we can expect the report/ recommendations of the 8th Central Pay Commission only during the middle of the year 2027," she said.

"By the time the government takes a decision, if it is sincere enough, it may go up to the end of the year 2027. The employees of both Central and State governments have to wait for another two more years to get their wages revised. This is an injustice on them," the trade union leader further said.

Ms. Kaur said the 'Terms of Reference' given by the government to the CPC is so rigid with lots of compulsions to finalise its recommendations, such as the economic conditions and fiscal prudence.

"All these [conditions] comes to the mind of the government only when it comes for giving any benefit to the employees and pensioners," she added.

Cong. slams Centre for using ancient text to draw labour policy

Highlighting a portion of the Union Labour Ministry's draft Shram Shakti Niti, 2025, which takes inspiration from *Manusmriti*, the Congress on Wednesday targeted the Narendra Modi government by alleging that it mirrors the Rashtriya Swayamsevak Sangh's (RSS) tradition of preferring the ancient text over the Constitution.

Congress general secretary (communications) Jairam Ramesh, in a post on X, claimed that the government is seeking to revive the principles of the *Manusmriti*, a Hindu religious text, through its new labour policy, and the move reflected the ideological influence of the RSS.

Mr. Ramesh claimed that the RSS had opposed the Constitution soon after its adoption for not being based on the *Manusmriti*. "The Modi government's

draft Shram Shakti Niti 2025, released earlier this month, claims that the *Manusmriti* embeds the moral basis of labour governance within India's civilisational fabric, centuries before the rise of modern labour law," he said in a post on X.

The Congress leader shared the text of the new policy, which says, "Ancient texts such as the *Manusmriti*, *Yajnavalkyasmriti*, articulated this ethos through the concept of *rajadharma*, emphasising the sovereign's duty to ensure justice, and the protection of workers from exploitation. These early formulations embedded the moral basis of labour governance within India's civilisational fabric".

Developing nations need 12 times more funds to fight climate crisis

To adapt to climate change, developing countries will require anywhere from \$310-365 billion (at least ₹27 lakh crore) annually by 2035, according to a United Nations analysis. This is nearly 12 times more than the money that currently flows from the developed to the developing world for this purpose.

The analysis, underlining the huge gap between the demand and supply of funds needed to protect developing nations from climate change impacts, appears in *Running on Empty*, an annual report on the shortfall released on Wednesday, ahead of the 30th edition of the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change Conference of Parties (COP-30) to be held in Belem, Brazil next month.

at \$26 billion (about ₹2.2 lakh crore) in 2023, down from \$28 billion the previous year. If these trends continue, a target agreed upon by countries at the COP-26 in Glasgow, to double adaptation finance to \$40 billion by 2025 will be "missed", the report added.

Disappointing target
Finance is a significant issue in climate negotiations, as developing countries insist that developed countries pay the costs of adap-

tive Quantified Goal (NCQG) on climate finance.

Tuesday's UN report underlines this criticism. "...it is far too evident that the financial resources needed to enable adaptation action in developing countries at the scale necessary to meet the growing challenges of current and future climate risks is woefully inadequate. It will take nothing less than a global collective effort to increase climate finance to the levels articulated in the Baku to Belém Roadmap to 1.3 trillion," it notes.

The report also raises concerns that whatever money has been made available at present is primarily classified as 'debt'. Although 70% of international public adaptation finance was concessional in 2022-23, it is "worrying" that debt instruments continue to dominate these overall flows, comprising 58% on average in that financial year, the report said.

Like rain-laden clouds

Nammazhvar in his Thiruvaimozhi uses the words *varu mazhai* – the rain that comes in, said Akkarakkani Srinidhi in a discourse. What is this rain that comes into Maaliruncholai? Explaining this verse in his commentary, Nampillai says Maaliruncholai has two kinds of rain! One is the benevolent Kallazhagar, the Lord of the kshetra. He is in Maaliruncholai permanently. He is the eternal cloud that gives, without moving away. But there are the regular clouds, the ones we see everywhere. They come in, give us rain and they move away.

When the Lord took Rama avatara, He showed His fondness for Sabari, who belonged to a clan of hunters. When Ramanuja had to be saved from Yadavaprakasa, who was planning to kill him, Lord Varadaraja of Kanchi and His Consort Perundevi took the form of hunters to save Ramanuja. They left him near a well, from which he took water to the Varadaraja temple every day. Thus they showered their mercy on Ramanuja, and gave the world a great Acharya. Just as Kallazhagar is a cloud that stays in Thirumaliruncholai, Varadaraja and Perundevi are clouds that remain forever in Kanchi, blessing devotees.

Ramanujacharya followed the Lord's example. He too was kindness personified, prompting Thiruvarangathamudanar to praise his mercy. Thiruvarangathamudanar wrote Ramanuja Nootrandadi, extolling Ramanuja's admirable qualities. In one verse he describes Ramanuja as *kaarai karunai Ramanuja* – Ramanuja, who is like rain-laden clouds. Just as clouds give without expecting anything in return, so did the Acharya give generously of his knowledge, justifying the comparison to clouds.

SEBI favours 'simpler' mutual fund rules

Regulator proposes to do away with old rules, simplify language, and rationalise fee structure; changes aimed at reducing investor costs

MUMBAI

The Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) has proposed major changes to mutual fund regulations to reduce investor costs and to make them simpler.

The markets regulator said that the proposals contained provisions to do away with old rules, simplify the language, and rationalise fee structures.

"Numerous amendments over the last 29 years have contributed to the MF regulations becoming considerably voluminous and complex. Hence, SEBI has undertaken an exercise to comprehensively review the MF regulations," according to a consultation paper.

As part of the efforts to make MF schemes cheaper for the investor, SEBI has done away with the additional expense of 0.05% charged by AMCs over exit load. "In 2012, mutual funds were mandated to credit exit load to the

scheme and AMCs were allowed to charge 20 bps more as additional expenses to the scheme. A basis point is one-hundredth of a percentage. The said additional charge, was reduced from 20 bps to 5 bps in 2018," SEBI said.

"The provision for additional expense of 5 bps allowed to the AMCs to charge the mutual fund schemes, was transitory in nature...with an objective to rationalise cost for unit holder, this expense charged to the scheme has been removed from the draft MF regulations," SEBI said.

To lighten the impact of the removal of additional expense on exit load, SEBI proposed that the first two slabs of the expense ratio of open-ended active schemes be revised upwards by 5 bps. It also proposed to exclude all statutory levy like STT, GST, CT, and stamp duty from the expense ratio limits along with the present permissible expenses for brokerage, exchange and regulatory fees. SEBI also proposed to reduce brokerage charges to 0.02% from 0.12% in cash market and 0.01% from 0.05% in the derivatives market.

AI wide-body ramp up in 2026: Wilson

Air India (AI) will induct a new wide-body aircraft every six weeks in 2026 for the next two years, which, alongside the refurbishment of legacy Boeing 787 and 777, will position it as a "modern, international" airline by 2028, according to CEO Campbell Wilson.

"Through the course of 2026 there is a massive ramp-up in our wide-body induction," Mr. Wilson said at the Aviation India Summit. The new additions will include the first of the 787-9s joining the airline in December 2025 and then in 2026, an average of one every six weeks. These will be mostly 787-9s and also two Airbus A350-1000s in the financial year 2026.

So far, the airline has in-

ducted six A350s from its order of 68 wide-body jets, which form part of its larger 570-aircraft buy from Boeing and Airbus. So far, the AI Group, including Air India Express, has added nearly 57 new planes. Overall, the airline will continue to add a new aircraft every six to seven days. By 2027, all of the 26 787 fleet will be refurbished fully.

Cognizant Q3 net income slides 53%

U.S.-based IT major Cognizant, which has a substantial number of employees in India, on Wednesday reported a 53% drop in net income for Q3 2025 to \$274 million, hit by a one-time, non-cash income tax expense of \$390 million.

Cognizant - which follows a January-December financial year - had posted a net income of \$582 million in Q3 2024.

Revenue, however, rose 7.3% year-over-year to \$5,415 million for the quarter ended September, driven by gains coming in from investments in AI.

The Nasdaq-listed IT services firm raised the lower end of its full-year revenue growth forecast, pegging it at \$21.05-21.10

billion against \$20.7-21.1 billion earlier. For the fourth quarter, Cognizant expects revenue in the range of \$5.27-5.33 billion.

Cognizant CEO Ravi Kumar S. said Q3 2025 marked the firm's fifth consecutive quarter of year-over-year organic revenue growth and strongest sequential organic growth since 2022. Sugar sector concerned over reduction in ethanol sourcing

Centre must raise ethanol procurement price.

The sugar sector is concerned over the cut in ethanol sourcing in the 2025-2026 ethanol supply year.

The Indian Sugar & Bio-Energy Manufacturers Association (ISMA) said only 289 crore litre ethanol had been allocated from sugar-based feedstock or 28% of the total need. The industry invested almost ₹40,000 crore with a capacity to supply 650 crore litre of ethanol a year. It supplied 330 crore litre last ethanol supply year.

The sector expects almost 345 lakh tonne sugar

output between October 1 and September 30, 2026. Of this, local consumption will be just 284 lakh tonne and sugar diversion for ethanol 34 lakh tonne leading to excess sugar stocks.

While the Fair and Remunerative Price of sugar-

cane rose 16.5% to ₹355 a quintal since 2022-23, ethanol procurement prices from sugarcane juice and B-heavy molasses was static at ₹60.73 and ₹65.61 a litre respectively. Ethanol's cost of production was ₹66.09 a litre from B-heavy molasses and ₹70.70 a litre from cane juice.

The minimum selling price (MSP) of sugar has been ₹31 a kg since February 2019 with output cost at ₹40.24/kg. The Centre must ensure 50% ethanol is sourced from sugar sector, raise MSP, announce sugar export policy and increase ethanol procurement prices, ISMA said.

Akasa IPO in two to three years, says CEO Dube

India mulls \$12-bn plan to bail out debt-laden State power discoms

India is considering a bailout exceeding ₹1 trillion (\$12 billion) for debt-laden state-run power distribution companies.

To receive the bailout funds, the States will be required to privatise their electric utilities and transfer managerial control or keep control but list them on a stock exchange, according to three government officials and a document outlining the plan prepared by the Union Ministry of Power.

The plan marks Prime Minister Narendra Modi's toughest reform push yet to overhaul the chronically inefficient state-run electricity distribution companies, seen as the weakest link in India's energy chain. The Power Ministry and the Ministry of Finance are discussing the final details of the bailout, with an announcement expected in the February budget, said two government sources.

The ministries did not immediately respond to Reuters' requests for comments.

Under the proposal, at least 20% of the state's total power consumption must be met by private companies and the States must assume part of the retailer's debt, according to the Power Ministry presentation.

To do so the States can choose to privatise their distribution operations for access to loans to pay off existing debt under two options. First, the States can create a new distribu-

tion company, divest 51% of the equity, which will enable them to access a 50-year interest-free loan for the privatised company's debt, along with access to low-interest federal loans for five years, the presentation showed.

The second option would let States privatise up to 26% of the equity of an existing State-owned power distribution company in exchange for access to low-interest loans from the federal government for five years, it showed.

Alternatively, States that do not decide to transfer managerial control through privatisation must list their utilities on a recognised stock exchange within three years.

States that choose to list would receive low-interest loans from the federal government for infrastructure management, the presentation showed.

The State power retailers have accumulated losses of ₹7.08 trillion (\$80.6 billion) and outstanding debt of ₹7.42 trillion (\$84.4 billion) as of March 2024, the documents showed.

Private companies such as Adani Power, Reliance Power, Tata Power, CESC and Torrent Power are expected to benefit from the reforms as they are likely to gain stakes in the State companies.

Hindustan Petroleum Q2 PAT jumps six-fold to ₹3,830 crore

State-owned refiner Hindustan Petroleum (HPCL)'s profit after tax in the second quarter rose six-fold on a year-on-year basis to ₹3,830 crore aided by better refining margins and a lower base effect. Gross refining margins more than doubled to \$8.80 for every barrel in Q2 from the corresponding period last year. Revenue from operations rose about 2% to more than ₹1.10 lakh crore. HPCL also announced an interim dividend of ₹5 for each equity share.

NMDC Q2 standalone net profit rises 33% to ₹1,695 crore

Iron ore producer NMDC reported standalone net profit rose 33% in the September quarter to ₹1,694.70 crore from ₹1,269.15 crore a year earlier. The higher net profit came on a 30% increase in revenue from operations to ₹6,260.85 crore (₹4,806.57 crore). The performance came in the backdrop of strong domestic steel demand and resilient mining operations. Iron ore production for the quarter was 23% higher year on year at 10.21 million tonnes (8.29 MT).

L&T posts 16% increase in Q2 net profit to ₹3,926 crore

Larsen & Toubro Ltd (L&T) for the second quarter ended September 30, 2025 reported a 16% year-on-year (YoY) growth in consolidated net profit to ₹3,926 crore backed by all-round performance. For the quarter, consolidated revenue grew 10% YoY to ₹7,984 crore. International revenues at ₹38,223 crore, constituted 56% of the total revenue. The consolidated order book of the group as on September 30, 2025, was at ₹6,67,047 crore, a growth of 15% over March 2025.

Hasina warns of mass boycott as her party barred from polls

The ban on the Awami League is not only unjust, it is self-defeating, says the deposed Prime Minister, adding she would not return to Bangladesh under any government formed after elections that exclude her party, and plans to remain in India

Millions of supporters of Bangladesh's Awami League will boycott next year's national election, after the party was barred from contesting the polls, ousted Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina said on Wednesday, from her exile in New Delhi.

Ms. Hasina, 78, said she would not return to Bangladesh under any government formed after elections that exclude her party, and plans to remain in India, where she fled in August 2024 following a deadly student-led uprising.

An interim government headed by Nobel Peace Laureate Muhammad Yunus has governed Bangla-

des since Ms. Hasina's ouster and has pledged to hold elections next February.

"The ban on the Awami League is not only unjust, it is self-defeating," Ms. Hasina said in emailed responses to Reuters — her

first media engagement since her dramatic fall from power after 15 straight years at the helm of Bangladeshi politics.

"The next government must have electoral legitimacy. Millions of people support the Awami

League, so as things stand, they will not vote. You cannot disenfranchise millions of people if you want a political system that works."

Bangladesh has over 126 million registered voters. The Awami League and the Bangladesh Nationalist Party have long dominated the country's politics, and the BNP is widely expected to win the upcoming vote.

The Election Commission suspended the Awami League's registration in May. Earlier, the Yunus-led government banned all party activities, citing national security threats and war crimes investigations into senior Awami League leaders.

"We are not asking Awami League voters to support other parties," Ms. Hasina said. "We still hope common sense will prevail

and we will be allowed to contest the election ourselves."

She did not say if she or anyone else on her behalf was holding any back-channel talks with Bangladeshi authorities to let the Awami League participate in the polls.

The International Crimes Tribunal, Bangladesh's domestic war crimes court, has concluded proceedings against Ms. Hasina, who faces charges of crimes against humanity over the violent crackdown on student protests in mid-2024.

Ms. Hasina denied the charges.

"These proceedings are a politically motivated charade," she said. "They've been brought by kangaroo courts, with guilty verdicts a foregone conclusion."

Pak. warns Kabul of stern response to new attacks

Pakistan's Defence Minister warned Afghanistan on Wednesday that any new "terrorist or suicide attack" by militants on Pakistani soil would draw a stern response, hours after talks between them in Istanbul failed to secure a peace agreement.

Earlier this month, Pakistan's military launched attacks on what it said were hideouts of the Pakistani Taliban in Afghanistan, killing dozens of people whom it described as insurgents. Afghanistan said the people killed were civilians and struck Pakistani military posts in response, claiming 58 Pakistani soldiers were killed. Pakistan's military said it lost 23 soldiers in the border fighting.

The two sides agreed to a ceasefire brokered by countries including Qatar on October 19 in Doha, fol-

lowed by four days of talks in Istanbul that ended inconclusively.

In a post on X, Pakistan's Defence Minister Khawaja Muhammad Asif told Afghanistan's Taliban Government that "any terrorist attack or suicide bombing inside Pakistan shall give you the bitter taste of such misadventures."

There was no immediate comment from Kabul on the collapse of peace talks or on Mr. Asif's remarks, but Afghanistan's state broadcaster RTA reported that the negotiations stalled because of

what it called "irrational demands" from Pakistan.

According to RTA, Islamabad sought assurances that no attacks would be launched from Afghan territory, while the Taliban delegation said the Pakistani Taliban, also known as Tehrik-e-Taliban Pakistan, was an internal issue for Islamabad.

Mr. Asif in a strongly worded tweet also accused Kabul of "blindly pushing Afghanistan into yet another conflict" to preserve what he described as its "usurped rule and war economy." "Let me assure them that Pakistan does not require to employ even a fraction of its full arsenal to completely obliterate the Taliban regime and push them back to the caves for hiding," he said.

Despite the failure of the talks, a ceasefire remained in place, and no new clashes were reported along the Pakistan-Afghanistan border.

U.S. will cut troops in Europe: Romania

Washington has told Romania, which neighbours war-torn Ukraine, and allies it will reduce the number of U.S. troops deployed on NATO's eastern flank, Romania's Defence Ministry said on Wednesday, a move some officials downplayed while analysts warned it could embolden Russia.

U.S. President Donald Trump has repeatedly criticised NATO, and insisted that European allies boost military spending as Ukraine battles Russia's invasion.

Some 85,000 American troops are stationed in Europe, including 20,000 troops deployed to rein-

force NATO's eastern flank after Russia invaded Ukraine in 2022, according to the U.S. Defence Department.

The latest announcement came after reports this year that Washington could withdraw 10,000 troops from eastern Europe as the U.S. focus shifts more towards the Indo-Pacific region, which the Pentagon called its "priority theatre".

"The resizing of U.S. forces is a result of the new priorities of the presidential administration, announced back in February," Romania's Defence Ministry said. The decision "also took into account the fact that NATO has strengthened its presence and activity on the eastern flank."

Myanmar junta says foreign media will be allowed to cover elections

International media will be allowed to cover Myanmar's upcoming junta-run polls, election authorities said Wednesday, an apparent invitation for foreign press to scrutinise the deeply disputed vote.

Myanmar's junta has "shattered the media landscape" with censorship and intimidation since staging a 2021 coup that sparked a civil war, Reporters Without Borders says.

Local journalists bore the brunt of the crackdown while foreign media quit the country en masse, with AFP the only international news agency maintaining a full in-country bureau.

The junta has touted polls starting December 28 as a path to peace, but the vote will be blocked from rebel-held enclaves and monitors are dismissing it as a ploy to disguise continuing military rule.

The junta-stacked Union Election Commission

said in a statement "both local and international news media will be allowed to cover" the election, due to unfold in phases over a matter of weeks.

The junta-run information ministry "will scrutinize and endorse eligible international media organ-

izations", said the notice in state newspaper *The Global New Light of Myanmar*.

Militants withdraw

One of Myanmar's most powerful ethnic armed opposition factions, Ta'ang National Liberation Army, has agreed to a China-brokered withdrawal from a lucrative ruby mining hub, the group said on Wednesday.

Myanmar has been mired in a civil war since the military grabbed power in a 2021 coup, with the junta fighting an array of pro-democracy guerrillas and powerful ethnic minority armed groups. The ruby-mining town of Mogoke was captured by rebels last summer.

Finalised trade deal with S. Korea: Trump

U.S. President Donald Trump indicated on Wednesday that a trade deal had been reached with South Korea's President Lee Jae Myung, before adding that the agreement was "pretty much" finalised.

"We reached a deal. We did a lot of different things. Great session," the U.S. leader said. But he then appeared to walk back the claim, telling a dinner including Mr. Lee that the deal was "pretty much finalised". "We came to a conclusion on a lot of very different items," Mr. Trump said.

In July, Mr. Trump said Washington had agreed to

cut tariffs on South Korean imports to 15% in exchange for a \$350 billion investment pledge. But steep auto tariffs remained in place, and the two governments were divided over the structure of the investment pledge.

Speaking to reporters, top Seoul presidential aide Kim Yong-beom confirmed a deal had been struck.

ing an injury to a joint near her collarbone a few days ago, then removed Anneke Bosch for a duck. Sciver-Brunt sent back Sune Luus, with just three runs added in the meantime.

Wolvaardt and Kapp's 72-run stand then steadied the ship, but Ecclestone pegged back by dismissing the former.

Sinalo Jafta and Annerie Dercksen soon followed, but Wolvaardt was unfazed, as she brought up a remarkable maiden ODI World Cup ton.

From 202 in 40 overs,

South Africa added 117 runs in the final 10, 68 coming off Wolvaardt's bat. When she fell in the 48th, the 26-year-old was patted back to the dugout by her opponents, after which ovations and hugs awaited.

Needing to pull off its highest chase in the format (the previous one being 264), England began abysmally, losing three wickets for just one run, Kapp (two wickets) and Ayabonga Khaka sharing the spoils.

The ever-reliable Sciver-Brunt hand-held the Herculean pursuit, building a

107-run stand with Alice Capsey.

A cramping Kapp persevered, sending Capsey, Sciver-Brunt and Sophia Dunkley back to complete a five-for, much like she did against the same opponent in a league stage win in the 2022 edition. Danni Wyatt-Hodge, playing just her second match of the tournament, and Linsey Smith resisted but in vain. The colour faded from the faces of the four-time champion as the dugout silently watched the curtains fall on its campaign.

ter. I'm learning the role better and trying to implement it tactically. It's about being a step ahead of the bowler, and I'm constantly working on that," said the 24-year-old.

Sai Sudharsan also highlighted the backing he has received from Gambhir.

"The support has been good. At the Arun Jaitley Stadium in New Delhi, GG sir called me aside. He told me not to get desperate and reminded me that I am here for a reason, that I'm one of the best players in the country.

"That reassurance gave me immense confidence and freedom. It helped me approach the game with the mindset to fight and win for my tribe," he added.

Archer's spell in vain as New Zealand clinches series

New Zealand defeated England by five wickets in the second ODI in Hamilton on Wednesday, with the return of Jofra Archer unable to ignite the visitors' full-throttle style of cricket.

The victory meant New Zealand clinched the three-match series with a game to spare after their four-wicket win in Mount Maunganui on Sunday.

England's batters flitted between reason and recklessness after New Zealand won the toss, with the visitors bowled out for 175 in just 36 overs.

Blair Tackner claimed four for 34 on his return to the Black Caps after being away for more than two years.

Harry Brook, who scored 135 in the first match, slashed a cut in the air to point off Mitchell Santner that was well taken by a diving Will Young. Jamie Overton was the pick of England's batters with 42 off just 28 balls, fol-

lowed by Brook's run-a-ball 34. England took hope from Archer's return who dismissed Young with the fourth ball of the innings and then troubled Kane Williamson and Rachin Ravindra with deliveries that seamed past both edges of the bat.

Williamson and Rachin shared a 42-run partnership before the former chopped on to his stumps for 21. Daryl Mitchell then arrived and combined for a 63-run partnership with Rachin, until he pulled Archer to backward square for 54.

Archer gave England faint hope with the dismissal of Michael Bracewell, completing match figures of 3-23 from 10 overs that included four maidens.

Mitchell, coming off a commanding 78 n.o. in the first match, steered the New Zealand chase to finish on 56 n.o..

However, Goa's win meant both sides - NorthEast United and Jamshedpur FC - are now out of the title race.

Juan Pedro Benali's men got the opening goal in the 20th minute when Nunez shot past Jamshedpur's 'keeper Albino Gomes after Jairo Samperio had rattled the woodwork with a powerful volley.

Nine minutes later, NorthEast United got the ball from back to front using five passes. Nunez then set up Ajarai in the box, who scored with his first touch.

Jamshedpur's Japanese talisman, Rei Tachikawa, then inspired the comeback: Pronay heading his corner and Messi Bouli scoring off his diagonal long ball at the far post.

All four teams will end their group stage on November 1, with the final round's Group B matches now dead rubbers.

Yudhvir: a vital cog in Jammu & Kashmir's pace battery

In his last two matches against Mumbai in the Ranji Trophy, the 28-year-old from Jammu has accounted for batters like Rohit, Jaiswal, Shreyas and Rahane; having played for India-A against Australia-A in two 50-over games in Kanpur a few weeks ago, the speedster is aware that he is catching the attention of the national selectors

Rohit Sharma, Yashasvi Jaiswal, Shreyas Iyer and Ajinkya Rahane are all batters with successful track records in international cricket. In his last two games against Mumbai in the Ranji Trophy, Jammu & Kashmir's Yudhvir Singh has accounted for all these batters.

The 28-year-old, athletic and broad-shouldered as is typical of his fast-bowling tribe, may not have experienced the bright lights of international cricket. But by dismissing players of proven pedigree in First Class cricket, Yudhvir is certainly exhibiting that he has the tools to make further strides.

In January this year, J&K came up against Mumbai at the Sharad Pawar Cricket Academy in Bandra in a proverbial David versus Goliath battle. While the 42-time champion had as many as six players with international experience in its midst, Paras Dogra's men were devoid of such high calibre. However, by the end, it were the J&K players who were rejoicing a five-wicket win - their second in a row over the domestic giant in India's principal First Class competition. Much of the credit for the victory could be attributed to Yudhvir -- he took four wickets in the first innings and three in the second to finish with a match haul of seven for 95 and claim the player-of-the-match award.

In mid-October, in Srinagar's quaint but highly-guarded Sher E Kashmir Cricket Stadium, Yudhvir was Mumbai's nemesis with the ball once again. Never mind J&K not getting over the line on this occasion - it went down by a narrow margin of 35 runs on a nerve-wracking final day - Yudhvir played his part to a large degree in keeping the host in the contest until the dying stages by taking a five-for in the first innings to restrict Mumbai to 386. In the list of batters that he dismissed were Rahane, Ayush Mhatre, Shams Mulani, Tanush Kotian and Shardul Thakur.

The opening day of the Ranji encounter hadn't begun auspiciously for the fast bowler. In his first six deliveries, he had conceded 12 runs. But a change of ends and a word of encouragement from his teammates enabled Yudhvir to regain his poise and go about his work. In a short span, he had the prodigiously talented Mhatre and the widely experienced Rahane in his kitty with deliveries that deviated off the pitch and took the outside edge.

"I just focus on my bowling. Sometimes, runs will be leaked. You shouldn't pay too much attention to that," Yudhvir threw light on his mindset in a chat during the Ranji fixture in Srinagar. "Even when runs are conceded, you should always think of coming back strongly. And when I got a second spell, I focused on putting the ball on one spot and being in rhythm. I did that and got wickets."

To get the better of Rahane, a man with 85 Test caps under his belt, pleased Yudhvir in particular. "My deliveries were moving well. And he had been beaten a couple of times. I just kept bowling the ball on that length. From there, it moved and took the edge," Yudhvir said with a gleeful smile.

India-A call-up

It is performances like these that have prompted the national selectors to promote Yudhvir into the India A set-up. A few weeks ago, Yudhvir, who has represented Lucknow Super Giants (LSG) and Rajasthan Royals (RR) in the Indian Premier League, played two 50-over matches for the Shreyas-led India A against Australia A in Kanpur. Though he scalped just one wicket and conceded 72 runs in 6.4 overs across the two outings, it offered a valuable learning experience. Apart from bowling to Australian internationals like Jake Fraser-McGurk and Cooper Connolly, there was also the perk of sharing a dressing room with the likes of Abhishek Sharma, Tilak Varma, Arshdeep Singh and Harshit Rana.

"India A was a very good experience. A few players had come in after playing the Asia Cup. There was a lot that I got to learn," he reflected. "Bowling to the Aussies and playing at a higher level, you are able to absorb a lot. And there are many to teach you as well. The coaches and senior players do come and share tips."

Greater attention on J&K

Yudhvir's rise has coincided with J&K's progress in the cricketing establishment. In September, Mithun Manhas, who was Director of Cricket Operations at the

Jammu & Kashmir Cricket Association (JKCA) after retiring as a player in 2017, was unanimously elected to the post of BCCI president at its 94th Annual General Meeting (AGM) in Mumbai.

While performance remains paramount in India's highly competitive environment, Yudhvir finds motivation in knowing that his numbers are being noticed by the men who matter. When he was picked in the North Zone squad for the season-opening Duleep Trophy in August, he was one of five J&K players in the 15-member contingent. National selector Ajay Ratra was present for the fixture between J&K and Mumbai in Srinagar.

"Yes, absolutely," Yudhvir replied when asked whether the performances of J&K players are catching the eye more than ever before. "With Mithun sir's arrival, J&K cricket has changed a lot. Everyone is getting opportunities."

"We used to get it earlier as well, but we didn't get as many opportunities. Now, even the national selectors are coming to see us. Last season, S. Sharath was the selector who came to see the match against Services where I took eight wickets. Then there was the match against Mumbai. I did well in that as well. There has been a lot of backing from Mithun sir and the coaches. That is when a team does well. Earlier, if we didn't do well in one or two matches, there would

be pressure and we would be out of the team. But the situation has changed for the better."

If not for Manhas, J&K may have actually lost Yudhvir to Hyderabad. While the six-foot tall quick represented the under-19 team of J&K, his Ranji Trophy and Syed Mushtaq Ali Trophy debuts came for the southern team in the 2019-20 season.

"I had gone to Hyderabad to give trials for the Army and get into the Services team. I bowled well there. There is regular league cricket in Hyderabad. I scored 365 runs and took 15 wickets in five matches," Yudhvir recounted. After that, I played for the Hyderabad under-23 side. Ambati Rayudu saw me there. He supported me. So, I ended up playing Ranji Trophy there. I played one season of Ranji and two seasons of T20 for Hyderabad."

But with Manhas keen to bolster the J&K outfit after taking charge, the Jammu lad was brought back home ahead of the 2022-23 season.

Yudhvir's prominence has been aided by the fact that he is part of an in-form pace attack also featuring the highly-promising Auqib Nabi and Umar Nazir. In J&K's run to the Ranji quarters last season, the trio fired collectively and shared 87 wickets. Nabi was also picked in North Zone's team for the Duleep Trophy this year and made headlines by claiming

four scalps in four deliveries against East Zone in Bengaluru. In the recent game against Mumbai, Nabi snared a five-for as well before going on to claim a match haul of 10 for 53 in a crushing win against Rajasthan in the second round.

"See, last season as well, we all bowled collectively and backed each other," assessed Yudhvir. "Sometimes, someone might not get a wicket and not bowl that well. But we keep backing each other as a pace attack. That's how we operate. Even if somebody concedes runs in a spell, we are there to support him and tell him that he will come back well in the next spell."

Strike bowler

As a quick bowler who is around the 140 km/h mark consistently, Yudhvir's role in the team is to land frequent breakthroughs. "I should get wickets for the team. That is my mindset," he stated.

It is possible to do, as he has understood, only when the right length is consistently hit.

"I used to bowl short of good length. But by playing regularly in the Ranji Trophy, my length has improved," he observed. "I can now consistently hit the good-length area. Bowling in Ranji teaches you a lot. In white-ball cricket, you can alter your length. But with the red ball, you have to consistently bowl in one area to get wickets. It came into my game last year, and I got wickets as well."

If Yudhvir has come into his own only over the past year or so, it may be because of his relatively late start. Belonging to a region where state-of-the-art facilities and a pathway aren't readily available, he played cricket with a tennis ball without any thought of taking up the game seriously until his late teens.

"I was 19 when I started playing with the leather ball," he informed. "Before that, I played tennis-ball cricket for 2-3 years. My friends used to push me to give trials, but I kept doubting myself and kept thinking about how I'm going to get selected as I didn't know what was the right way to go about it. Coming from a middle-class family, my father wanted me to focus on my studies. But my sisters backed me, they used to keep telling my father to let me play."

Once he overcame his jitters and attended the trials, he was on the right track.

"First time I went to the trials, I got selected in the under-19 team. In my first match, I took five wickets against Mumbai. But I did not have any idea about how to pace myself. I bowled well, but got really tired as it was the first four-day match I was playing," he remembered. "I learnt a lot from that experience. Since then, I haven't turned back."

Nanometre 'tank' of helium reveals weird waves never seen before

When cooled to just a few degrees above absolute zero, helium becomes a superfluid – it can flow without any friction or viscosity; this means an ultra-shallow film of superfluid helium, a few nanometres thick, can move freely without getting stuck – something impossible for any normal fluid

Imagine a tsunami, a colossal wave capable of traveling across entire oceans and causing immense destruction. Now, picture another special kind of wave, known as a soliton. Unlike a regular wave that spreads out and loses energy, a soliton is a solitary wave that holds its shape and speed over incredibly long distances. These powerful and mysterious waves are examples of what scientists call nonlinear wave dynamics. Understanding them is crucial for everything from predicting natural disasters to designing better communications systems.

For decades, scientists have studied these waves in enormous, hundred-metre-long water tanks called wave flumes. By generating waves in these controlled environments, they can observe how they behave.

However, even the biggest and most advanced wave flumes have a major limitation: they can't replicate the extreme conditions that create the most powerful nonlinear waves found in nature, like the sheer force of a tsunami or the intensity of the world's most extreme tides. "Nonlinear" here means the wave's behaviour doesn't scale in a simple, proportionate way; instead, small changes in conditions can produce disproportionately large or unpredictable effects. The physics behind these waves is very complex, and reaching the level of nonlinearity seen in nature has been impossible to achieve in a lab.

Incredible properties

This is the challenge a team of researchers from the University of Queensland in Australia set out to surmount. But instead of going even bigger, they went much smaller.

They created a wave flume on a microscopic chip and used a unique kind of fluid to generate waves more powerful (relative to their size) than anything ever seen on the earth. Their goal was to create a platform to study the full range of nonlinear wave behaviour in a controlled, miniature environment.

"The study of how fluids move has fascinated scientists for centuries because hydrodynamics governs everything from ocean waves and the swirl of hurricanes to the flow of blood and air through our bodies," study coauthor and ARC Future Fellow Christopher Baker said in a statement. "But a lot of the physics behind waves and turbulence has been a mystery."

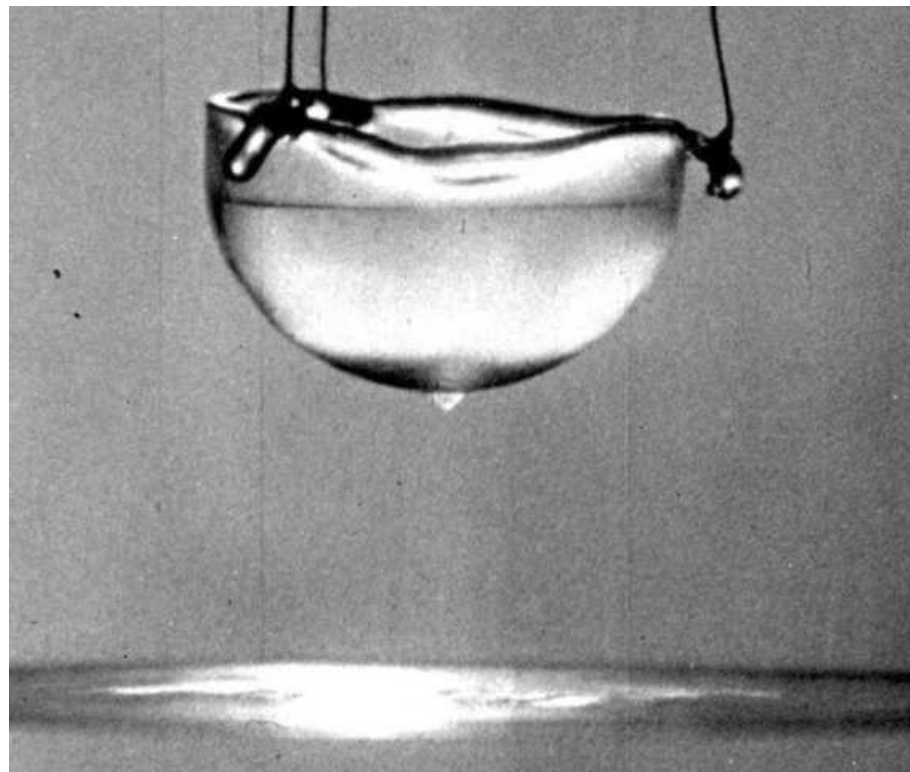
The findings were published in *Science* on October 23.

When cooled to just a few degrees above absolute zero, helium becomes a superfluid – a unique quantum state of matter with incredible properties. Most importantly in this context, it can flow without any friction or viscosity. This means an ultra-shallow film of superfluid helium just a few nanometres thick can move freely without getting stuck. This is impossible for any normal fluid.

The team fabricated a silicon beam about the width of a human hair on a chip. When cooled, a 6.7-nm deep film of superfluid helium could naturally coat this beam, creating a perfect wave channel.

Lilliputian paddles

The next challenge was to make waves in such a small system and see them. At one end of the silicon beam, the team built a photonic crystal cavity – a structure with

nanometre-wide holes that trapped light. When the researchers shone a laser into this cavity, it heated the superfluid helium slightly.

Superfluid helium has another strange property: it flows towards rather than away from heat, a phenomenon called the fountain effect. By rapidly changing the laser's intensity, they could create pulses of heat that pushed the superfluid, like a Lilliputian light-powered paddle.

Second, the height of the helium film affected the light trapped in the cavity. As a wave passed by, raising or lowering the fluid's surface, it slightly changed the light's frequency. By monitoring the light coming out of the cavity, the researchers could precisely measure the shape and height of the waves in real-time in a very sensitive way. Thus, this all-optical system allowed the team to both generate powerful waves and observe their behaviour on a microscopic scale.

With their chip-scale wave flume up and running, the researchers were able to observe a whole host of nonlinear phenomena that had previously been stuck on paper.

One of the first things they observed was backward steepening. In a normal water wave, the crest moves faster than the trough, causing the wave to lean forward and eventually break.

In the superfluid, they saw the exact opposite. The troughs moved faster than the crests, causing the wave to lean backwards before breaking. This strange behaviour had been predicted for superfluid helium decades ago but had never been directly observed.

Solitary waves

Second, by cranking up the power of their laser paddle, they generated even more extreme waves and witnessed the formation of near-instantaneous shock fronts: where the wave's leading edge becomes almost vertical. And then, they saw something even more spectacular: soliton fission. The powerful initial wave, instead of just breaking, split apart into a train of smaller, perfectly formed solitary waves, or solitons. The team was able to generate a train of up to 12 of these solitons from a single wave pulse.

Intriguingly, these solitons weren't like those we normally see in water, which are

peaks that rise above the surface. These were hot solitons – propagating as depressions or troughs below the average fluid depth. Read that again: below the average fluid depth. They're called hot solitons because their troughs are slightly warmer than the surrounding superfluid. This remarkable observation confirmed another long-standing prediction about superfluid dynamics.

"Using laser light to both drive and measure the waves in our system, we have observed a range of striking phenomena," said Dr. Baker. "We saw waves that leaned backward instead of forward, shock fronts, and solitary waves known as solitons which travelled as depressions rather than peaks. This exotic behaviour has been predicted in theory but never seen before."

Macroscopic to microscopic

Using a microscopic platform to study waves evidently had several advantages. First, the experiments played out much faster. Phenomena that would take hours to observe in a giant water tank unfolded in just milliseconds, allowing scientists to collect vast amounts of data quickly.

Of course, one question is pertinent here: can we be sure that what happens at the macroscopic scale is/will be exactly replicated at the microscopic scale, with the same forces and phenomena at play?

The short answer is 'no', we can't assume that what happens at the macroscopic scale is exactly replicated at the microscopic scale – but this doesn't mean the study's findings aren't applicable to the waves we see in water bodies.

At the macroscopic scale, say, in a 100-m flume, gravity and inertia

dominate whereas at nanometric scales, like the 6.7-nm helium films in the study, gravity becomes negligible; instead, van der Waals forces and surface tension dominate. So although both systems can be modelled by shallow-water hydrodynamics, the effective gravitational acceleration is replaced by a van der Waals term in the corresponding equation – in this case, the Korteweg-De Vries (KdV) equation. However, the equation's form itself doesn't change.

Put another way, both microscopic and macroscopic waves are governed by the same mechanics; it's just that the physical constants are different and the equation has different terms that dominate.

One of these constants is the Ursell number, which dictates how hydrodynamic behaviour scales nonlinearly with depth and amplitude. This is why shrinking a system by a factor of a million doesn't linearly scale its dynamics. Instead, the system is 'pushed' into an entirely different regime.

Second, at the microscale, the helium film is a quantum fluid, not a classical substance. Its viscosity vanishes, heat flow drives its motion (via the fountain effect), and strange phases of matter like quantised vortices become possible. None of these exist in classical macroscopic fluids. Similarly, the crystal cavities also modify how waves disperse, producing wave behaviour that's impossible in natural flumes.

However, researchers aren't claiming their experiment reproduces the exact same physical forces as in a macroscopic water flume but that their waves-on-a-chip setup obeys the same (KdV) hydrodynamic equation in form.

Specifically, what allows them to compare the superfluid flumes and a real oceanic flume isn't identical forces—which don't exist – but the mathematical equivalence of the governing equation.

In the study, the team worked under limiting conditions where the fluid's depth is low, also known as the shallow-water limit. In this regime, the dynamics governing the waves depend on three dimensionless parameters: the Ursell number, the aspect ratio (ratio of depth to length), and the dispersion coefficients in the KdV equation. If two systems share the same three forms of these parameters, then, even if one involves gravity and the other involves van der Waals forces, their wave evolution should be dynamically similar.

Put another way, the chip experiment wasn't meant to reproduce a tsunami in miniature but to reproduce the same mathematics of nonlinear wave evolution. And in the paper, the researchers described three things they did to prove they did so in a correct way.

First, they used a custom Euler solver, which is a full hydrodynamic model with nonlinear behaviour due to van der Waals forces, and the KdV equation to model the experiment and found that it could do so correctly.

Second, they plotted the Ursell number in their microscopic experiment and found that it curved up to cross a value of 100 million. Thus they could conclude that their experiment was hydrodynamically equivalent to, or exceeded, what they might have seen in a large flume.

Third, they observed wave steepening, shock-front formation, and soliton fission – which is the very sequence of formations that the theory predicts for waves of large amplitude in shallow water.

Finally, overall, the authors of the new study have been careful not to say "we've shrunk the ocean onto a chip." Instead their paper repeatedly emphasises the differences between the two scales: that gravity is replaced by van der Waals acceleration, that dispersion is engineered using light (rather than naturally), and that the fluid is a superfluid with zero viscosity.

Toolkit to explore

The second advantage was that the system was very easy to control. The researchers could finely tune the waves' properties by adjusting the laser power and the thickness of the superfluid film. They could also modify the chip's design to create different channel shapes or place obstacles in the waves' way, providing a toolkit to explore complex fluidic phenomena.

Finally, according to the study paper, the work also pushes the boundaries of optomechanics – the study of how light and mechanical motion interact. The extreme nonlinearities observed go beyond the gentle perturbations typically studied in this field, opening a new regime of nonlinear dynamics.

Hurricane Melissa a 'beast' among a string of monster Atlantic storms

Hurricane Melissa, which struck Jamaica with record-tying 296 kmph winds on October 28, was a beast that stood out as extreme even in a record number of monster storms spawned over the last decade in a superheated Atlantic Ocean.

While more storms these days are undergoing rapid intensification – gaining 356 kmph in wind speed over 24 hours – Melissa did a lot more than that. It achieved what's called extreme rapid intensification – gaining at least 92 kmph over 24 hours. In fact, Melissa turbocharged by about 112 kmph during a 24-hour period last week and had an unusual second round of rapid intensification that spun it up to 280 kmph, scientists said.

"It's been ... just a beast of a storm," Colorado State University hurricane researcher Phil Klotzbach said.

When Melissa came ashore it tied strength records for Atlantic hurricanes making landfall, both in wind speed and barometric pressure, which is a key measurement that meteorologists use, said Mr. Klotzbach and University of Miami hurricane researcher Brian McNoldy. The pressure measurement tied the deadly 1935 Labour Day storm in Florida, while the 296 kmph wind speed equalled marks set that year and during 2019's Hurricane Dorian. Hurricane Allen reached 304 kmph winds in 1980, but not at landfall.

Usually when major hurricanes brew, they get so strong that the wind twirling in the centre of the storm gets so intense and warm in places that the eyewall needs to grow, so a small one collapses and a bigger one forms. That's called an eyewall replacement cycle, Mr. McNoldy said, and it usually weakens the storm at least temporarily.

Melissa showed some signs of being ready to do this, but it never did, Mr. McNoldy and Klotzbach said.

Another weird thing is that Melissa sat offshore of mountainous Jamaica for a while before coming inland. Usually mountains, even on islands, tear up storms, but not Melissa.

"It was next to a big mountainous island, and it doesn't even notice it's there," Mr. McNoldy said in amazement.

Warm water is the fuel for hurricanes. The hotter and deeper the water, the more a storm can power up. But when storms sit over one area for a while – which Melissa did for days on end – it usually brings cold water up from the depths, choking off the fuel a bit. But that didn't happen to Melissa, said Bernadette Woods Placky, chief meteorologist for Climate Central, a combination of scientists and journalists who study climate change.

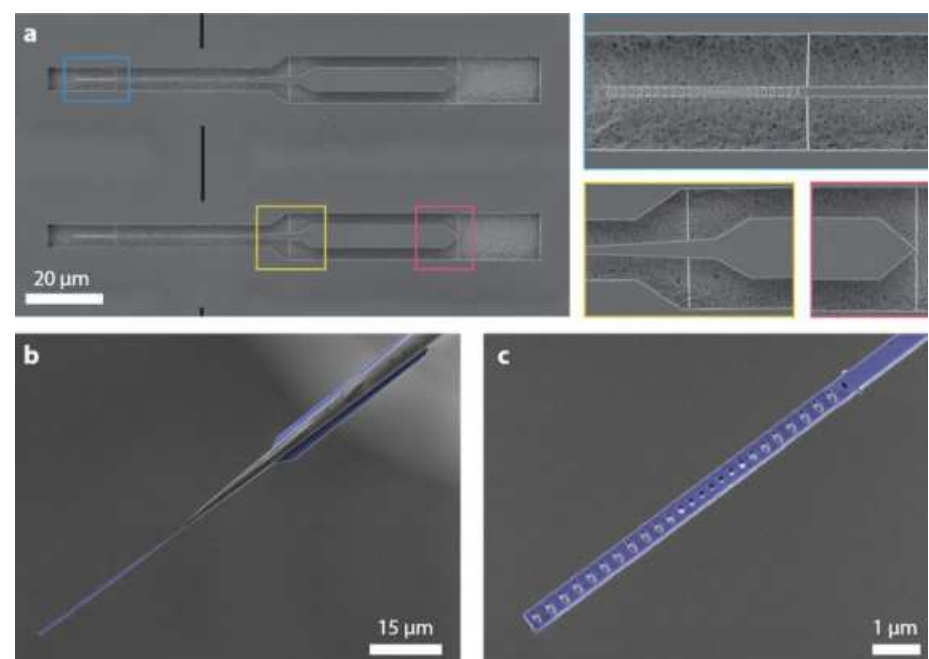
"It's wild how almost easily this was allowed to just keep venting," Ms. Placky said. "This had enough warm water at such high levels and it just kept going."

Melissa rapidly intensified during five six-hour periods as it hit the extreme rapid intensification level, Mr. McNoldy said. And then it jumped another 56 kmph, and "that's extraordinary," he said.

For meteorologists following it, "just your stomach would sink as you'd see these updates coming in," Ms. Placky said.

"We were sitting at work on Monday morning with our team, and you just saw the numbers just start jumping again, 175. And then again this morning (Tuesday), 185," Ms. Placky said.

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What is China's complaint against India at WTO?

What is the Production-Linked Incentive (PLI) scheme in India? Which three specific PLIs does China oppose? What are the World Trade Organization's rules when it comes to subsidies? What does the Subsidies and Countervailing Measures agreement state?

The story so far:

China has filed a complaint with the World Trade Organization (WTO) against India. It alleges that India is providing subsidies, as part of the Production-Linked Incentive (PLI) scheme, for the development of advanced chemistry cell (ACC) batteries; for boosting the auto sector; and for facilitating the production of Electric Vehicles, in contravention of WTO law.

What is the PLI scheme?

India launched the PLI scheme in 2020 to give a fillip to Indian manufacturing. This scheme provides financial incentives based on incremental sales to strategic industries; aims to bolster India's position in global value chains; and integrates medium and small-scale industries into the industrial production process through backward linkages. The three specific PLI schemes that China has challenged are – the PLI scheme which aims to incentivise the establishment of mega-scale manufacturing capabilities of ACC batteries in India; the scheme for the auto industry, which seeks to buttress the manufacturing of Advanced Automotive Technology (AAT) products in India, encompassing both vehicles and their components; and third, a scheme to promote EV manufacturing by attracting global EV manufacturers to the country.

What is China's complaint?

China alleges that the three PLI schemes provide financial benefits or subsidies to companies operating in India contingent on Domestic Value Addition (DVA). For instance, under the PLI scheme for the auto sector, one of the conditions for eligibility to get financial benefits is that there must be a 50% DVA. Likewise, one of the salient features of the PLI scheme for ACC batteries is that the beneficiary must ensure a DVA of 25%. The Chinese

argue that the DVA requirements under these PLI schemes incentivise companies to use domestic goods rather than imported goods, discriminating against Chinese goods in the Indian market.

What is the law on subsidies in WTO?

While providing industrial subsidies to boost domestic industry is a sovereign right of states, WTO law ensures that these subsidies are not provided in a manner that jeopardises the international trade of other countries by ushering in unfair competition. Unfair competition may arise from subsidies that confer an artificial advantage on industries for exporting or competing with imported products. Consequently, the grant of industrial subsidies is regulated by the Subsidies and Countervailing Measures (SCM) agreement of the WTO. Article 1 of the SCM agreement defines a subsidy as a financial contribution by a government or a public body that confers a benefit. The

subsidy should also be specific.

The SCM agreement divides subsidies into three categories – prohibited subsidies, actionable subsidies, and non-actionable subsidies. Prohibited subsidies are forbidden by definition and are generally of two types: export subsidies and Import Substitution (IS) subsidies. Export subsidies are contingent on export performance, and IS subsidies, as defined in Article 3.1(b) of the SCM agreement, refer to subsidies contingent upon the use of domestic goods over imported goods. Thus, if a country promises a financial contribution to a specific industry on the condition that it use domestic goods or goods produced locally, rather than imported goods, it would constitute a prohibited subsidy.

Do IS subsidies violate other laws?

An IS subsidy will also breach two other WTO legal provisions. First is the national treatment obligation, codified in Article

III.4 of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT), which obligates countries to ensure that their domestic laws do not treat imported products less favourably than their domestic products; and second, is Article 2.1 of the Trade Related Investment Measures (TRIMs) Agreement which states that no country shall impose any TRIM that is inconsistent with its national treatment obligations enshrined in GATT's Article III. The TRIMs agreement contains a specific illustration of a prohibited trade-related investment measure. This illustration pertains to local content requirements which incentivise the use of domestically produced goods. Since an IS subsidy gives preference to domestic over foreign goods, it constitutes as a proscribed TRIM under the WTO law.

China alleges that India's three PLI schemes are IS subsidies. However, it is critical to note that the DVA milestones in India's PLI scheme do not automatically translate to local content requirements. Value addition at the domestic level can occur in multiple ways, and not just through the use of domestic goods. The analysis of the DVA component in these three PLI schemes must thus consider a complex set of facts.

What happens next?

The first step in resolving a dispute at the WTO is through consultations. Thus, India and China will try to resolve this matter amicably. If this does not occur, the dispute will proceed to adjudication by a three-member ad hoc WTO panel. The WTO's appellate mechanism, the Appellate Body, has remained incapacitated since December 2019. Thus, if the WTO panel's decision is appealed, it would mean postponing the adjudication of the dispute till the time the Appellate Body is resurrected. The practical implication is that the status quo remains, and a country can continue with its impugned measures.

How do cyclones form and how are they measured?

How can high wind shear disrupt the formation of a cyclone? What is an eyewall?

The story so far:

If you think of a cyclone as a machine, it would be an incredibly powerful entity – an engine that draws heat from the earth's tropical waters to drive destructive winds, heavy rainfall, and storm surges. Similar storms are known variously as hurricanes in the Atlantic and eastern Pacific Oceans, and typhoons in the western Pacific Ocean.

How do cyclones form?

A tropical cyclone begins as an area of low pressure, often associated with clusters of thunderstorms. For such a disturbance to develop into a cyclone, several atmospheric and oceanic conditions must come together. The most important is warm sea surface temperature, generally above 26.5°C and up to a depth of at least 50 m. When moist air near such a water surface rises,

it releases its latent heat, cools, and condenses to form clouds. The released heat warms the surrounding air, causing it to rise even further and drawing in more moist air from below, setting up a self-reinforcing cycle of convection.

A second important condition is that the atmosphere must be unstable, that is, rising air must continue to rise rather than being forced back down, and there must be a sufficient Coriolis force (a deflection of circulating air due to the earth's rotation, causing it to curve right in the Northern Hemisphere and left in the Southern Hemisphere) to induce rotation. As the Coriolis effect is weakest at the equator, cyclones rarely form within about five degrees of latitude from it. At the same time, the vertical wind shear, which is the difference in wind speed and direction between the lower and the upper levels of the atmosphere, must be low. High wind shear can disrupt a cyclone's organised circulation and

keep it from building in strength.

As the cyclone develops, a well-defined centre called the 'eye' may form. This is a calm, clear region surrounded by a ring of towering thunderstorms that produce the most intense winds and heaviest rainfall, called the eyewall.

Air spirals in towards the low-pressure centre at the surface and rises rapidly near the eyewall, while at higher altitudes it flows outwards, completing the circulation.

How are cyclones classified?

Since the storm draws energy from the ocean through evaporation, it can intensify as long as it remains over warm water. Cyclones are primarily classified by their maximum sustained wind speed and central pressure. Different ocean basins use slightly different classification schemes but the principle is the same. In the North Indian Ocean, the India Meteorological Department classification

ranges from a 'depression' (31-49 km/hr) to 'super cyclonic storm' (>222 km/hr).

For measurements, meteorologists use ground-based observations, aircraft reconnaissance, satellite data, and ocean buoys. Satellites play a crucial role in monitoring cyclones over remote ocean areas: infrared images help estimate the temperature of cloud tops, indicating storm intensity, while visible and microwave sensors reveal structure, rainfall distribution, and eye formation.

In the North Atlantic, specialised aircraft called hurricane hunters fly directly into storms to measure wind speeds, pressure, humidity, and temperature. Instruments called dropsondes are released into the storm, transmitting data as they fall. In the Indian Ocean, satellites and automated buoys provide most of the data.

How well are cyclones forecast?

Forecasting the path and intensity of cyclones remains a complex challenge. Sophisticated numerical weather models simulate atmospheric and oceanic conditions, but even small errors in initial data can lead to large uncertainties. Advances in computing power, remote sensing, and data assimilation have improved forecasts significantly over the last few decades. Today, most meteorological agencies can predict a cyclone's track three to five days in advance with reasonable accuracy.

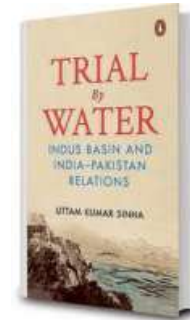
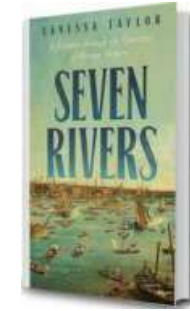
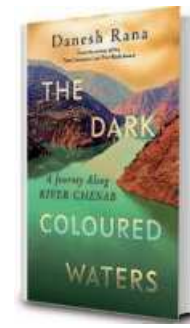

The Indus conundrum: when water is both a lifeline and a faultline

Writers are beginning to explain the ramifications of the suspension of the Indus Water Treaty, which was a shared heritage between India and Pakistan. Others map how global warming is impacting the balance in nature, and take stock of the fallout of political decisions on all rivers

Do rivers have stories to tell? As he prepared to map the Chenab, “a river of diplomacy enshrined in the Indus Waters Treaty”, Danesh Rana was reminded of a Bashir Badr couplet: “*Agar fursat mile paani ki tahriron ko padh lena, har ek dariya haazaron saal ka afsana likhta hai.* (If you get the time, do read the writing of the water. Every river writes a tale of thousand years.)”

In his memoir and travelogue, *The Dark Coloured Waters* (Juggernaut), Rana, who has served as an IPS officer in the erstwhile State of Jammu & Kashmir, profiles the river with the help of myths, legends, anecdotes and photographs, including one of the highest railway bridges in the world across the Chenab in Reasi district. He also describes the state of the river post-the Pahalgam massacre when India suspended the Indus Water Treaty, brokered by the World Bank in 1960.

“A day after the suspension of the treaty, the sluices at Baghlihar and Salal Hydroelectric Projects were closed,” he writes. Soon, the water receded rapidly, “turning the roar of the river to a whimper,” and people began to walk across the river.

Is it possible to halt or divert rivers? Rivers are the proverbial natural arteries of ecological systems. They are also worshipped, navigated and dammed. From the ancient ecosystems of Egypt to the sinking cities of Shanghai, rivers are valued differently. No wonder, some of our major river systems are also drying, and ultimately dying. Despite such

ambiguity, rivers have remained intertwined with humanity.

Water history

A river determines water history in any region, seasonal variation in its flow being the prime determinant. With the bulk of water in the system coming from rainfall and snow melt in the mountains, a river finally flows to the sea to complete its essential hydrological cycle. Of all rivers that have tried to complete the hydrological cycle, the story of the Indus basin stands as one of modern history’s great stories of large-scale environmental transformation. It is also a story of changing relationships between society and the state.

In 2015, Prof. David Gilmartin of North Carolina State University argued that a large-scale environmental history of the Indus basin was yet to be written (*Blood and Water*, University of California Press). The Indus basin’s history has long been the subject of historical attention. Although a largely arid region, the Indus basin became one of the globe’s most heavily irrigated river basins. Though the flow in the river in the six months from October to March is just 16% of the total annual flow, floods in the summer months have been historically significant.

It is claimed that the Indus basin supplies 80% of the water for Pakistan’s irrigated agriculture – that it employs nearly two-thirds of the labour force and generates a quarter of the national GDP. Such a linear relationship has been climatically challenged. Triggered by extremely heavy rains, the July-August 2010 Indus floods affected some 20 million people; two million homes were

destroyed; 1.6 million head of livestock died and the economic losses amounted to \$43 billion. Though the consensus was that it was a once-in-a-hundred years event, the fact remains that thanks to rapid global warming, a greater climatic uncertainty surely looms.

Floods and irrigation

No message is more powerfully conveyed by the floods’ damage than that massive human development has vastly increased the system’s vulnerability. Together with this, large-scale irrigation projects have become a tool to dominate nature. Erik P. Eckholm had noted in the 1970s that “the greater irrigation works in modern times had come to dramatise the dangers inherent in efforts to expand large-scale control over nature without sufficient attention to the ‘ecological requisites’ of nature itself.”

The Indus basin is not bereft of such transformation or vulnerability, and it is in this light that the river ought to be studied. The Indus Water Treaty was a shared heritage between India and Pakistan, till its suspension in April 2025. Consequently, the future of the water-sharing treaty between upper riparian India and lower riparian Pakistan remains shrouded in mystery writes Uttam Kumar Sinha in *Trial by Water* (Penguin, 2025). As per the treaty, the water of the five rivers of Punjab used to flow into the Indus. It may not in future. All these rivers show similar patterns of flow, and their vicissitudes have dictated much of the basin’s hydrogeography. However, all this is going to change if river water is diverted (over time) by the upper riparian state.

At this moment, is it apposite to delineate the fundamental hydrogeography of the Indus basin and its complex flow patterns? How water becomes both a lifeline and a faultline in the contested south-Asian landscape is the lingering question. Under the changing situation, can the river be allowed to flow its course to fulfil its ecological obligations of flowing to the sea to complete the hydrological cycle?

Mounting stress

However, to focus solely on bilateral tensions is to miss the larger picture. “The Indus Basin must be seen as a single, interconnected whole – its challenges not confined to legal frameworks or diplomatic flashpoints but rooted in deeper ecological struggles,” writes Sinha. With the basin now confronting surging water demand, climate shocks and mounting water stress, the stakes are only intensifying in the future. Can this decades-old treaty evolve to meet a new era of crisis, rekindling its role as a platform for cooperation?

Rivers themselves have always had their own logic: their natural beauties, their floods, droughts, their tendency to silt up, their changes of course, tipping points and disappearances, as Vanessa Taylor puts it in *Seven Rivers* (Weidenfeld & Nicolson, 2025). Rivers have shaped our lives, just as we have shaped theirs. Changing hydro dynamics of the Indus river offers a view of the world where the person and the river are seen in relation to each other. Love, grief, and hope flow through the river.
